It is reported that wool has advanced to 10c a pound at The Dalles since the election.

W. J. Edwards delivered another bunch of fine beef cattle at Arlington this week.

Ray Henson came over last week from Malheur county to look after his cattle interests in this county.

The street politician's job is gone. Wonder if he has saved enough out of it to carry him through the winter?

Jas. Snipes of The Dalles has just sold to Geo. Keller a bunch of very fine beef cattle, which were raised on his Matney ranch.

U. S. Deputy Marshal J. M. Bentley of Pendleton went over to Waldron this week to arrest a man who violated the timber laws.

The attempt to organize a lodge of Maccabees at this place by Miss Rebecca Smith last week proved a failure, for the present, at least.

Mrs. Herbert Halstead has been under medical treatment at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Rinehart, the last two weeks.

Hundreds of factories have opened up in the East since the election, and it is sincerely hoped that the terrible financial panic is at an end.

Mrs. John Palmer left Tuesday for a visit to the home of her daughter, Mrs. Frank Hanna, at Trail Creek, B. C., where she will likely spend the winter.

Thursday night of next week is Woodmen night and as there is very important business to transact, all of the members are requested to be present. Don't forget it.

L. W. Darling is invoicing his stock of drugs this week, with a view to selling out to Dr. Hudson. There is no certainty yet as to whether a sale will be made or not.

G. W. Strong, who eloped from Mitchell a year or more ago with another man's wife, has left Idaho and gone to Butte, Mont., where they are running a lodging (?) house.

The total vote in Oregon will be about \$3,000 while in June it did not exceed \$7,000, a gain of 6000 votes in round numbers. Very few of the voters remained away from the polls this time.

August Kroeschel, a young merchant of Corvallis was held up one day last week in broad daylight, three miles from town, and robbed of \$1020 in gold. He was very foolish for carrying so much money with him, anyway.

The only change in the election from our mention in last issue is that California went republican and Nebraska democratic. Wyoming is still claimed by both parties. McKinley's majority of electoral votes will be about 90.

Dan McDonald and Chas. Shurtz came in today from Mitchell and Grant county where they had been to buy sheep for eastern shipment. Scab was too plentiful to suit these gentlemen and consequently purchases were few.—Eagle.

A large number of republicans congregated in town Monday evening and in the most vigorous manner ratified McKinley's election by firing anvils, tooting horns, etc. Had it not been for this ratification perhaps McKinley would not have qualified.

Supt. Dagggett, assisted by Mrs. Lillian Stevens and Chas. Roysse, are conducting teachers' examination at Condon this week. Only three applicants are present—Miss Mollie Hurlbert of Arlington, Miss King of Blalock and Mr. J. R. Dimmick of Olex.

Mrs. Mary Marvin of Spokane, upon learning of Bryan's defeat, fell dead, so great was her grief. Mr. Bryan didn't take it that hard himself. He simply drew a long breath and remarked that "the fight has just begun and silver will come out on top in 1909."

Charley Rinehart of Mountain Home, Idaho, is in this section in the interest of the Monroe Publishing House, for which he has been traveling all summer. One of his duties is to appoint agents in every county he visits. At Pendleton the other night two hobos stuck a shooter under Charley's nose and held him up for all the money he had with him—about \$40, and made their escape.

In a rough and tumble fight with J. D. Craig, a barber at Eugene last Sunday night, Gainey Mathews, formerly of Mayville, was stabbed in a number of places with a knife, the blade penetrating his lungs, and his face and arms were slashed in a frightful manner. His injuries are not considered fatal, however. Gainey is one of the owners of the Eugene Flouring mill.

Last Saturday was very windy, causing the R. R. men to keep a gang of men out to keep the track clear.

D S Healy, our tinner, has jumped the town and gone to parts unknown, leaving an opening for some good man.

Harry Clay started the first of the week for the East with a train load of sheep, (7000) which he expects to feed and put on the market this winter.

Our hand boys blew up quite a crowd last Saturday night that attended the A. O. U. W. entertainment. The boys can raise a crowd any time on short notice.

A freight train was wrecked near Cello last week, caused by a defective car wheel, killing one man who happened to be standing near the track as the train was passing.

For the last couple of weeks Arlington is as lively as during its palmiest days—10 or 12 years ago. The half-dozen or more clerks in J. W. Smith's store are kept on the jump almost day and night.

Over an inch and 1/4 of rain has fallen here within the last few days, putting the ground in fine condition for plowing. That with 68c for wheat makes the farmers come to town wearing a smile that would melt a rock.

Several car loads of hogs were shipped from here a few days ago to Portland. Why not induce someone to start a packing establishment somewhere in the county and make Eastern Oregon a hog country as well as wheat, wool and stock? Think about it capitalists.

Mr. Cecil, one of Willow Creek's oldest settlers, died at this place last Friday, where he had been confined to his bed for several weeks. He leaves a large family and many friends to mourn his loss. He was the first white man to settle on Willow creek, some time in the 50's.
