About 100 geese were killed in this section last week.

THANKSGIVING
At Condon Nov. 26.

Shooting will commence at 9 o'clock a. m. and beef, turkeys, ducks and chickens will be shot for.

There will be five choices in shooting for beef. The distance, with a rest, will be 150 yards; off-hand, 100 yards. Turkey's head, off-hand, 40 yards; with rest, 60 yards; turkey's body, 200 yards, rest or off-hand.

Target shooting for all kinds of poultry, various distances.

Should the weather be bad or stormy the distances will be shortened to suit.
