The Pendleton East Oregonian says: Wool growers and dealers are expecting too much for their products from Mr. McKinley's election. The rise before the election is the limit to anticipate from the result. Tariff legislation will effect the price of wool very little, nothing like as much as growers have been led to believe. Eastern wool journals are now setting up the claim that before there can be any particular advance in wool there must be legislation favorable to the American manufacturer, who will have to receive a higher price for his products before he can afford to pay more for the wool from which he manufactures them.

An exchange truthfully says: A town is a large party. We are all interested in each other's welfare, or should be. A cut-throat, every-man-for-himself policy means ruin for any community. It means retrogression and failure. The first lesson any family must learn is, that to be happy and successful is unity and municipal assistance. The same applies to the business life of a town, and the more generally it is obeyed the more abundant will be the town's prosperity.

Within the next sixty days the disembarkment of the once great Union Pacific system will be completed. Only the over-mortgaged, debt-buried main line, from Council Bluffs to Ogden and Kansas City to Cheyenne, will remain of the system which once stretched from the Missouri river and the Gulf of Mexico to the mouth of the Columbia river and which maintained the greatest fleet that ever rode the Pacific ocean.

It appears that nearly all of the republican politicians of the country have done nothing since the election but make out a cabinet for Mr. McKinley—just as though he had no say in the matter. McKinley receives, on an average, 2,000 letters per day from hungry office-seekers, who are just dying for a chance to "save the nation" by holding a government position.

Illinois has a law that makes it a criminal act for a cashier to receive deposits within thirty days of closing its doors. Two bankers in Chicago have just been sent to the penitentiary for violating the law. If the Hon. J. E. Frick had his just deserts he would also be playing checkers with his nose on the bars of a penitentiary cell.

Indiana congressmen have notified all applicants for postoffice positions in that state that in every town and precinct there must be a vote taken and the applicant receiving the highest vote will be the one they will endorse for appointment. Why wouldn't that plan work in other states as well as Indiana?

The Cincinnati Enquirer, after fighting McKinley to the bitterest extreme, made the following judicious comment when the returns came in: "It is the judgment of this journal that the grazing would be better if the fall rains had been more profuse."

There are in the Argentine Republic about ten million cattle, and the remarkable thing about them is that they are all descendants of eight cows and one bull which were brought to Brazil in the middle of the sixteenth century.

All of the great politicians of the nation feel confident that had it not been for the "national democratic" ticket Bryan would have been elected. That party was "little, but oh my!"

Kentucky's official count gives the democracy one elector. The remaining twelve go to the republicans. The official count gives Wyoming to Bryan by a very small plurality.

The old story that Spain is seeking the aid of the powers against the United States is again revived, but Spain has officially denied that such is the case.

Now that so many mills are starting up all over the country it looks like the "mill" between Corbett and Fitzsimmons would also start up.

Wm. J. Bryan opened his four years' campaign for silver in Denver last night. Great arrangements were made for the occasion.

It is said in Washington that early in March President Cleveland and Secretary Carlisle will establish a law office in New York.

Spain having procured a further loan of \$85,000,000 there is naturally some curiosity to know what else she has to pawn.

It is reported that forty out of every 1,000 persons in the United States are color blind.
