Regarding the possible economy of the legislative body this winter the Oregonian says: "There is one thing that appears evident. This is, the clerical force of the next legislature will not be based on the number employed in the past. The incoming session will be under control of the republicans, and economy in public affairs promises to be their watchword. There will not be so many soft snaps, for either men or women, and many clerkships maintained in the past are likely to be entirely dispensed with. Instead of 150 clerks, there may be not more than 40, and these positions will be given mostly to men who are fully competent to perform the duties expected of them. Senators or representatives will hardly dare to put their wives and daughters on the state payroll as legislative clerks, when it may be shown that all such alleged service is entirely unnecessary."

It is probably true, as Col. Waterson of Kentucky says, that not more than two of the Southern states actually voted themselves out of the Union in 1860-61, but that, under the influence of a few resolute self-confident leaders, "whole communities were driven like herds of cattle down the mountain side by a sort of unconscious impulse. This view is fortified by the fact that when the war was over these people found it easy to assume their alliance and are now thoroughly devoted to the Union and the flag against which they so gallantly fought."

H. W. Scott, editor of the Oregonian, is mentioned for secretary of the treasury. McKinley might seek further, but he can find no better qualified gentleman for this cabinet position than the editor of the leading paper of the Pacific coast. Certainly no other dozen men in the whole West has done more for the gold standard than has Mr. Scott. An enthusiastic admirer declares that Scott is the brainiest editor in the United States.

When Mr. Cleveland came to Washington in 1885, to begin his first term as chief executive of the nation, he did not possess more than \$3,000 or \$4,000 at the outside. The most correct estimate would show that he is now worth about \$1,000,000, most of it having been made in successful real estate speculations. One piece of Washington property that he bought for \$24,000 he sold a short time after for \$248,000.

It is supposed that meteors begin to burn when they are within 125 miles of the earth, and that combustion is completed and that they disappear at from 35 to 50 miles above the earth. When we see a falling star, therefore, we may consider that we have watched it through a flight of about 100 miles before it finally burns out and disappears from view.

There ought to be no question as to Senator Mitchell's position on the money question. In his speech at McMinnville he quoted the St. Louis platform and said: "On this I stand and on this I have stood—bimetallism by international agreement." Could any words be more pronounced than these?

The capital at Portland would be more convenient for the majority of the people of Oregon than Salem. Portland would be glad to meet the expenses of the removal and reimburse the state for any loss occasioned by the change of the seat of government.—East Oregonian.
