GLOBOSITIES.

J. W. Blake visited Portland last week. G. W. Rinehart has just had his restaurant repaired.

The GLOBE will take county warrants on account at face value. Mrs. Maddock arrived home yesterday from Portland and Mt. Angel.

All legal notices should be sent to the GLOBE in order to insure correctness and avoid going to the double expense of having the work to do over again.

Prof. Morey informs us that Condon now has the largest school in the county, having an enrollment of 105 pupils, nearly all of whom are in daily attendance.

Messrs. E. P. Weir and W. J. Edwards delivered at Arlington the first of this week for the Portland market 101 head of as fine beef cattle as ever tickled a palate.

Rev. R. C. Oglesby, a pioneer M. E. minister, is lying at death's door at his home at Myrtle Point, Douglas county. Rev. Oglesby is well known to many people of this county.

Geo. Rose of Fossil came over to the county seat Thursday on business before the county court. His wife accompanied him. Charley McKenzie was also over on business Monday.

The only correct statement of the condition of the Arlington National Bank for the quarter ending Dec. 17th appears in the GLOBE this week. Read it and you will find that the bank is in a very sound and prosperous condition, and is sure to continue that way so long as it remains in as safe hands as it now is.

Within the last three months \$67,561 have been paid into the land office at The Dalles by settlers in Gilliam, Sherman and Wasco counties for railroad land, which explains to some extent the present scarcity of money. The land thus entered, amounted to something over 53,000 acres, which hereafter will be taxable property.

Our city council last week made a very fair and liberal proposition to the county court, having offered to donate \$1000 towards building a \$7,000 court house at Condon, to be built within a year. But the court did not consider it favorably, and Gilliam will have to struggle along with the distinction of being the only county in the state without a court house.

The state tax levy has been fixed at 4 mills, a reduction of only eight-tenths of a mill below the levy of last year. Our county and school levy, aggregating 16 mills, makes a total of 20 mills our people will have to pay, besides the never-failing extra school taxes, etc. The total amount of state revenue to be raised is \$72,707.88, and Gilliam's share of it is \$4,838.70.

Gilliam county has been consolidated by the Co. court into two road districts and hereafter instead of "loafing out" road tax in 20 districts, the cash must be paid and the two supervisors—J. H. Bowen and J. W. Maguire—will hire what help they need. Just what benefit this system will be over the old one remains to be seen, but it looks like it ought to work to advantage.

The Fossil paper erred last week in stating that the Sheepmen's Protective Union in this county has been in existence 1800 months. It should have read 18 months. It also erred in saying that Dr. Howard went to Antelope to consult with "Dr. Howard" in the case of Nate Baird, who is very sick with liver troubles. As there is no doctor at Antelope by that name, the paper no doubt means Dr. Pilkington.

The matter of establishing a telephone line from Arlington to Fossil, along the stage route, is being agitated again, and will likely be made to stick this time. Homer Comfort of Arlington was out through the county this week ascertaining how badly the people want such a line. The proposition is to either organize a joint stock company, or pay a bonus and have it built by private parties. Such an enterprise is badly needed and we hope it will not be allowed to fall through again.

The regular stockholders' meeting of the Arlington Nat'l bank was held Tuesday, Jan. 12th. There were present Mr. D. M. French of The Dalles, Mr. E. B. McFarland of Portland, L. C. Edwards, A. C. Hawson and F. T. Harlbart. The following directors were elected: D. M. French, W. W. Steiwer, E. B. McFarland, L. C. Edwards and A. C. Hawson. The same officers were retained for the ensuing year—D. M. French, president; W. W. Steiwer, vice-president, and F. T. Harlbart, cashier.

Representative J. E. David went to Salem last week to be in readiness to attend the legislature, which convened Monday. On Saturday he was horrified upon discovering that he had forgotten his certificate of election, without which he could not be recognized as "in the swim." He took the first train coming east, arriving at Arlington Sunday morning. He had a chance to come to Condon in less time than he could make the round trip to his home, so he came out here and secured another certificate from the county clerk and lit out again for dear life, expecting to reach Salem at 10 o'clock Monday morning, which he could do, barring accident.

The revival here by Rev. Johns is still progressing with unabated enthusiasm. Rev. Hornbrook of Goldendale had intended to assist him with the good work, but could not make it suit to come. However, the presiding elder, Rev. Robert Warner of The Dalles, will be here next Sunday and will perhaps assist. In the revival work next week, Rev. Warner will preach here on Sunday evening, after which communion services will be held. On Monday morning following, at 10 o'clock there will be held the regular quarterly conference meeting, at which all of the members and those interested in church work are requested to be present.

The GLOBE, having three or four times more bona fide subscribers in this county than any of the other papers, of course was re-designated the county official paper, which position it has held for the last six years. Notwithstanding this fact the county printing, amounting to perhaps \$50 a year, was let to one of the other county papers, which has scarcely any subscribers in this county outside of the town in which it is published—because its bid was a few cents lower than ours. This makes us think that if our county court exercised the same persistency in compelling the large city firms to bid on the contracts for what supplies are furnished this county, hundreds of dollars could be saved to the county each year.

Our day school has started up again, with a fairly good attendance.

James Williams has been summoned to appear as a witness at Pendleton next week.

Our Sunday school has just purchased a new and interesting library, much to the delight of the children.

Several of our church people expect to attend the quarterly conference at Condon next Sunday and Monday.

Oregon was hit this week with the tail-end of the snow storm which has been raging in the Central West for ten days.

Capt. S. H. Miller of Goldendale arrived Saturday, but too late to attend the burial of his son-in-law, J. S. McKinney. His daughter and her children will accompany him home this week.

After two weeks of horrible suffering from blood-poisoning, J. S. McKinney died at Fossil last Friday, Jan. 8th, and was buried there next day in the Odd Fellows' cemetery. The sad and untimely death of our neighbor and friend has cast a gloom of sadness over the entire community. Profound sympathy is felt for his grief-stricken young widow and two little children, who are left almost destitute. The deceased had been talking for the last year or more about joining the Woodmen, but unfortunately for his family, the poor fellow was called away without having a chance to join.

After all the officers were duly installed a grand feast was spread, which had been prepared by the sister Rebekahs, which was followed by a speech on Oddfellowship by Mr. E. P. Weir, also M. Putz's class in vocal music singing several selections.

We regret to announce the death of Mrs. John Perrin, who died last Saturday at her home on Pine creek, of quick consumption, after an illness of only a few weeks. County publications awarded to the Arlington Record—the lowest bidder—at 25c per square.

CONDON GLOBE designated the county official paper; compensation to be nominal, in view of the fact that county court proceedings are published as news matter.

Warrant ordered drawn in favor of C. Seibert in lieu of one lost for amt of \$17 50—bond to secure the county on file.

License granted to G. E. Portwood to sell spirituous, malt and vinous liquors in less quantities than one gallon in Mayville precinct.

Rebate of \$3.46 allowed Ed Bell on taxes and warrant ordered drawn for the same.

Right of way granted Chas McKenzie & Co for telephone line from Fossil to Arlington, provided same be built within six months from Fossil to Condon and within one year on to Arlington; the part from Condon to Arlington being optional—line not to obstruct public travel, etc.

J. W. Maguire appt supervisor of road dist No 1 and J. H. Bowen appt road supvr road dist No 2.

COMMISSIONERS COURT.
Tax levy fixed as follows: County purposes 9 mills, school purposes 4 mills, road purposes 1 1/2 mills, coyote bounty 1 1/2 mills. This, with state levy of four mills, makes a total of 20 mills.

Road poll tax levy is \$2 upon every person subject to pay a state poll tax.

Road districts re-established: Ordered that all that portion of Gilliam county lying north of a line commencing at the mouth of Thirty-mile creek, thence up said stream to where the North Fork of Thirty-mile creek intersects the same, thence up said North Fork of Thirty-mile creek to where said stream crosses the south line of sect. 31, 4p 4 of r 23, W. M. then east on the line to the S. E. corner of tp 5 s of r 24 e, shall be known as road district No 1; and all that portion of Gilliam county lying south of the said line shall be known as road dist No 2.

Road supervisors for 1896 ordered to certify an accounting of road dist tools in their respective districts to the county clerk before warrants can be drawn for their services as such.

Reports of all road supvrs for 1896 were accepted upon their filing certified list of tools with the county clerk, except dist No 19, which report was continued for correction.
