ONE BILL THAT OUGHT TO BE DEFEATED.

Senator Gowan of Harney, Grant and Morrow, has introduced a bill which bears the earmarks of having been prompted by the large cattle corporations, and it will no doubt cause all small owners to rise in vigorous opposition. The bill provides, in Section 1:

"It shall be unlawful for any person owning any sheep, horses or cattle, or for his agent, or for any person having any sheep, horses or cattle in charge, in any county in this state, or for any person outside of this state to move or drive sheep horses or cattle into this state, for the purpose of pasturing or herding such sheep, horses or cattle upon the public lands, or upon any land owned by any person other than the owner of such sheep, horses or cattle, or his agent, or the person having them in charge, without the permission of the owner of said land; and any person violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor."

Then follows a provision that livestock may be driven over lands with the consent of the owners, or over public lands, if two weeks and no longer is consumed in the driving.

Section 2. Any persons violating the provisions of this act shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$250; and the sheriff of the county in which such conviction shall take place shall have power to remove such sheep, horses or cattle from said county at the expense of the owner of such sheep, horses or cattle, or his agent, or the person having them in charge, and said sheriff is hereby given a lien upon said sheep, horses or cattle to recover said expense.

Section 3. Courts of justices of the peace are hereby given concurrent jurisdiction of offenses against the provisions of this act.

"I shall adopt the old profession after March 3d," said Senator Peffer, the defeated populist senator of Kansas. "I was elected to the senate from an editor's desk, and I shall take up my work where I left off. I am the editor of the Topeka Advocate, and through the medium of that paper I will advocate the principles of the populist party. My efforts will be directed toward keeping our organization intact. I see there is a disposition on the part of some of the fellows to follow Bryan and his people. I, for one, am not in favor of a coalition of forces. I think we made a great mistake this year when we held our convention after all of the other great conventions were over. Had we assembled first and nominated our man the democrats would have had to come to us; we would not have allowed ourselves to go to them, as we did this year. The populist party is a great party; it is the party of the future, and I am willing to do all in my power to advance the principles expounded in our platform of 1892-94."

The full text of Senator Dawson's bill providing for semi-annual payment of state taxes by the several county treasurers is as follows: "See 2813. On or before the first Monday of April in each year, the several county treasurers in the state shall pay over to the state treasurer, in gold and silver coin, one-half of the state taxes charged to their respective counties, and on or before the first Monday of October thereafter they shall pay over the remainder of said taxes." This would be an excellent law and the bill ought to pass.
