The gossip of Milton have a new problem to solve. A grass widow is at the bottom of the affair. After seven long years of single blessedness a bouncing baby boy arrived to brighten her lonely life and lend enchantment to the view, says an exchange.

It is said that runaway horses are almost unknown in Russia. No one drives there without having a thin cord, with a running noose around the neck of the animal. When the horse bolts, the cord is pulled, and the horse stops as soon as he feels the pressure on its windpipe.

A bill patterned after the North Carolina liquor bill passed the house in the Washington legislature last week, and it is thought will become a law. This will put the entire sale of all intoxicating liquors in the hands of officers appointed by the state.

J. H. Bowen of Fossil, the veteran road worker and general supervisor, was in this section the first of the week in the interest of the Black Butte grade, east of town. He did not forget to leave his measure for a year's worth of this excellent family paper.

A woman of Kansas has applied the arguments of the temperance people to the wearing of corsets, and has written to the governor asking him to recommend in his message a law forbidding their use, sale and manufacture. As far as this paper is concerned, the ladies can all wear corsets if they want to.

The enterprising little town of Burns, the county seat of Harney county, proposes to have waterworks and electric lights some time in the future. The town council has granted a franchise to a local company, allowing the company four years in which to complete the water and light system.

The Fossil boys were unavoidably delayed in reaching Condon Monday until late in the afternoon, and consequently the football game was cut short by night coming on. It was a spirited game while it lasted, but neither side succeeded in scoring a goal. As the game quit with honors about even, the \$22 purse was divided between the two clubs.

Several land transfers were made this week. Henry Ramsay of Beecher Flat purchased of Ad Smith the old Keeney place, consisting of 320 acres; consideration \$800. Samuel Slater also bought of Henry Ramsay a 160-acre timber culture for \$350. Both deeds were made out by Clerk Frazer on Tuesday.

There are 63,000 men at work on the Siberian railroad. Before long any Condon man (with the price of the fare) will be able to take a train here and go to any part of Europe, with only a change from cars to ocean steamer at Astoria, and from ocean steamer to cars again at some port on the coast of what is now Chinese territory.

The county court of Harney county is advertising for bids for printing the stationery for the county officers, such as letter heads, envelopes, legal blanks, records and all other stationery used by the county officers and paid for by the county, which will no doubt result in a large saving for that county.—Vale Advocate.

W. J. Vanhorn and family arrived here last week from the northern part of Missouri and expects to locate near the home of his twin brother, J. W. Vanhorn, on upper Hoover creek. Like his brother, he is industrious and honest, and to all such newcomers we extend a hearty welcome. J. W. met them at Arlington Thursday.

J. A. Ward of Arlington was through this section this week, in the interest of J. W. Smith, taking orders for all kinds of farming machinery. Mr. Smith has made arrangements with large eastern firms whereby he is enabled to sell all kinds of machinery and wagons from 25 to 50 per cent cheaper than ever before sold for in this country.

The citizens of Havstack held a meeting at the school house last Saturday night for the purpose of raising a bonus to aid a Spokane gentleman to build a grist mill at some suitable place in that neighborhood. Several hundred bushels of wheat were subscribed, but it is not known if it will be a sufficient inducement to warrant the building of the mill.—Prineville Review.

Hon. A. W. Gowan, the republican senator from Grant, Harney and Morrow counties, has introduced a bill which has the appearance of being a direct thrust at the sheep industry of Eastern Oregon, and is rather a surprise to the sheep raisers, since last June it was supposed that every nominee of the republican party was an avowed friend of the wool grower.—Times-Mountaineer.

The new law passed by congress to prevent the sale of intoxicating liquors to Indians is a stringent one. The minimum fine is \$100 and costs, and further provides that the offender shall be imprisoned until the fine and costs are paid. As the man who sells liquor to Indians is generally a hobo, and could not raise \$100 in 100 years, the sentence would virtually be imprisonment for life.

The Enterprise, of Wallawa county, says from present indications the man who has cattle to sell next spring will have no difficulty in disposing of them at good prices. A number of outside buyers have been around to see what can be got hold of in the cattle line, and local buyers are offering \$13 for yearling steers and \$17 for 2-year-olds. These are better prices than have prevailed in that section for several years.

School Supt. Daggett last week mailed blanks to all of the school clerks in this county. These blanks are required on or before the annual meeting, but the delay this year he informs us is due to the fact that our legislature not having done any business this session, nothing was done to authorize the printing of the forms. With the blanks he also mailed a circular letter calling the attention of the school officers to certain points in the school law, which is well for them to observe. We are pleased to note the increased activity along educational lines this spring and trust it will continue.

The woman's suffrage amendment to the constitution of the state of Nevada, was defeated in the assembly last week by a vote of 15 to 13. The legislature thinks it has done enough in the line of advancing civilization, in licensing prize fighting, and draws the line at equal suffrage. It is but just to add that the Kansas legislature the same day took similar action on the question. The ladies (bless their little hearts) appear to be getting the worst of it on all sides, this religious paper regrets to note.

A Mayville correspondent sends us the following item: The entertainment and basket supper at Mayville on the 19th, for the benefit of the Union church to be built here this spring, was a decided success. The short program was very good. So were the contents of the baskets, which were the prettiest ever seen here and well filled with goodies. The ladies received about \$50 as proceeds. After the entertainment and supper, the Odd Fellows gave a ball and very generously donated the proceeds toward the fund for the new church, for which the ladies tender them their heartiest thanks.

A large crowd attended the ball at Condon Monday night, 62 numbers having been sold. This leaves something over \$40 to be applied to the debts of the band. The three judges—Mrs. Gager of Arlington, Mrs. Ella Rinehart of Mayville and Mr. Shorb of Thirtymile, decided that Miss Mollie Adlard of Ajax was entitled to the prizes for having the neatest calico dress, and Claud Henshaw carried off the gentleman's prize. There were a number of very pretty costumes worn by the ladies, making it a difficult task for the judges to decide, but Miss Adlard was the lucky one.
