Dr. Hogan was called out the first of the week to the Stevens ranch, east of town, to prescribe for the little child of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Stevens, for capillary bronchitis.

John Meek, who has been shipping sheep from Montana to St. Paul for a year or so, is at home on a visit. He made a business trip to Heppner this week, starting Wednesday.

After a brief visit with her folks here, Miss Mabel Halstead began teaching her school at Blalock again this week. Her sister Ethel will remain with her and attend that school the remainder of the term.

At the school meeting last Monday Myron Clarke was elected director to serve three years, in place of John Maddock, whose term expired. P. H. Stephenson was elected clerk, having defeated Ed Dunn, who was a candidate for re-election.

Mr. and Mrs. T. G. Johnson, the newly-married couple, have already gone to housekeeping at Condon in their fine residence, which the groom had elegantly furnished and all ready for the occasion. Their many friends join the *Globe* in hearty congratulations.

The Sheepmen's Union, which met at Condon Saturday, decided to make a levy of one cent per head of all sheep owned by the union, pay off all the present indebtedness and discontinue the bounty for the present, at least. There are about 1200 scalps on hand to pay off.

Anyone in this county knowing anything at all about any effort that has ever been made to raise flax in Gilliam county, are requested to communicate with Henry Heidmann of Fossil. The U. S. Department of Agriculture has requested him to furnish such information.

Within the last two weeks we have received 16 new subscriptions to the *Globe* from the Fossil country, which runs our list over the 150-mark for Fossil and the south end of the county. They all say that they appreciate a paper that is not always a week or two behind time.

Grant Wade sends us the following item, which is of interest to horsemen: There is a band of horses 3 miles below Clem that are affected with the mange. They were driven here from Umatilla county last October. Only prompt action on the part of the stock inspector will keep this disease from spreading.

Mr. M. Scott of Hoover Creek, as honest an old gentleman as ever lived, was over to town this week on road business before the county court. He says the *Globe* is their favorite paper over there and that everybody in the Fossil country knows that when they go to the office on Thursday evenings their *Globe* is always there for them.

R. O. Tobey and M. E. Weatherford are running three 3-14 inch New Departure gangs on their farms, doing good work and turning 42 inches of another earth with about the same expense that other farmers have in cutting 24 inches.

T. J. Smith, the popular Fossil miller, was in this section the latter part of last week buying wheat for his mill, and bought about 1000 bushels of first-class wheat from W. S. Myers, G. G. Farman and Pat Skelly. He requests us to say that anyone having wheat to sell can make money by seeing or writing him before selling.

Bill Black, who deserted his family at Mayville two years ago and went to Canada, returned home last week, dead broke, and the most miserable man in America. Some of the little surprises he found was that his wife had married again and the children scattered, one of them being in the state reform school. Truly, the way of the transgressor is hard.

All of the papers are making a wonderful fuss about a little daughter being born the other day to Mr. and Mrs. Ben Harrison. There is nothing surprising about it; those happenings occur in the best-regulated families, and there is no occasion for the country to go wild about it. Had the little girl been hatched out in an incubator, then perhaps it would be a little surprising, but it wasn't.

A terrible accident happened to Clarence Shinnake yesterday. The little fellow was leading a horse in town, when the vicious brute jumped around and kicked him in the face. For awhile it was thought the boy was killed, but Dr. Hogan, who was hastily summoned, found that he was only unconscious and worth a whole army of dead boys. His nose is broken and one eye badly damaged. He and his mother had intended to start in a few days for their home in Colorado.

Not a great deal of interest was taken in the city election Tuesday. The principal fight was between H. B. Hendricks and Ed Dunn for recorder, the latter receiving only 17 out of the 46 votes cast. Mr. Hendricks receiving the balance of them. S. B. Barker was elected mayor; A. Henshaw, W. L. Wilcox P. H. Stephenson and C. C. Wilson councilmen, and Dr. Hudson was re-elected treasurer, Ed Moore having refused to accept the nomination.

While coming to town the other day Mr. Williams' team ran off and smashed things up badly, including Williams' nose, which he now carries in a sling.

District Atty Jayne last week sold his residence property here to S G Hawson and his housekeeping outfit by auction sale on Saturday, and he and his family have moved to The Dalles to reside.

Dr. Geisendorfer was over to Dot last Sunday fixing up John Openheffer, who was kicked and nearly killed by a horse. He has been brought to town for treatment, and is in a precarious condition.

W H Colwell, O S Ehl, J M Johns, J C Sweet and several others have just repainted their houses, which adds much to the town's appearance. Let the good work go on, and Arlington will soon look like a new city.

Frank Cecil, formerly of Willow creek, who deserted his wife (see Miss Hattie Phillips of Olex) two years ago and went to Wyoming, was found frozen to death near Rawlins, in that state, several days ago. His body was shipped to Arlington for burial, arriving here Wednesday.

Games and other amusements which kept the crowd in good cheer until 12 o'clock were indulged in.

Twickenham Twitchets.

The river is wild and woolly again and almost over the banks. Travel is completely shut off, as the ferry has gone "belly up" and we can't get lumber to repair it. Don't you think we need a bridge over here?

We do not care whether there are two or twenty supervisors, if there is only a chance to work out the tax for those who are willing to work. But it looks to us like an imposition on the sheriff to expect him to keep track of the army of fellows who might tell him that they are willing to work out their tax, but who have no intention of doing so, and will thus escape working or paying their tax. As it is not his duty it cannot be expected of the sheriff to also look after the road work, and it is a loophole through which many a deadbeat will escape paying his road tax. As infallible and mistake-proof as the county judge claims to be, there are many intelligent people who believe the court made a grave mistake in making this change. The conditions in the sparsely-settled Eastern Oregon counties are vastly different from the thickly-populated counties in the Willamette valley, where the judge has selected Clackamas county as an example to go by.

Some years ago, when this was all in Wasco county, cattle and horses were worth something. Stockmen then tried hard to get a bounty on coyotes and cougars, which at that time were very destructive on young stock. The only help we got from the county court was a reply to the effect that if we wanted the coyotes killed to kill them ourselves, that there was no law against it. But now when our interests are destroyed, owing to the country being "sheeped to death" our court sees fit to saddle a tax onto us for the benefit of the few sheepmen. All of the horsemen and cattlemen and many others are opposed to this tax. The county would be benefitted a great deal more by letting it go toward a court house at Condon, or for bridges over the John Day river. At present this county does not own one decent bridge. An effort has been made to get our county court to assist Crook county in building a bridge at Parson's ferry, but the matter was squashed and no satisfaction given, although Crook county signified a willingness to stand half the expense if this county would stand the other half. As this county would receive more benefit out of it than Crook, why does not our county court take the lead in the matter, instead of waiting for a less interested county to do so? A bridge at this place would be of tremendous benefit to this county, in the way of bringing trade and travel through the entire county. A bridge should have been built here long ago, and then the toll roads on the other side would not have eaten up all the profit of the farmers and stockmen, who would gladly do their trading in this county were they only given an opportunity to do so.
