Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Donaldson and daughter Stella stopped in town Friday night, while on their way home to Fossil from Heppner, Sam having met them at Arlington.

H. B. Hendricks recently received from Chicago one of those fine Daugherty Visible typewriters, which is a great improvement over the old styles. He's got so he can play on it pretty well already.

A Cor. from Eightmile to the Heppner Gazette says: It is rumored that a merchant from Lone Rock is going to bring his store from there to Elgin Mile Centre. This is considered a good business stand.

Owing to sickness in his family, Stock Inspector F. A. Hale is unable to look after the diseased horses near Clem himself. He has deputized Geo. Caven to do so, and George went down yesterday to quarantine the band of about 150 head.

Judge Mariner informs us that the ballots for last June election cost \$25, instead of \$75, as mentioned in this paper, the balance of the \$75, being for other supplies. The Globe was misinformed in the matter and cheerfully makes this correction.

J. A. McMorris has just received a state diploma, good for six years, of which he is justly proud. Mr. McMorris is rated as one of the ablest and most successful teachers in the state. He will begin teaching in the district north of town next Monday.

Mr. John Palmer and son Ed have gone up to Trail Creek, B. C., to try their luck in the rich mines there. Mr. Palmer has a son-in-law at that place who is largely interested in the town and owns some valuable mines there. Mrs. Palmer will remain here for the present.

The little infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Halestead, which had not been well since its birth a month ago, died on Thursday night of last week with convulsions and was buried in the cemetery here next day. Much sympathy is felt for the parents in their sad affliction.

A series of religious meetings was begun at the Jordan hall last week by Rev. Royce, the Baptist preacher who has made so many friends here by his matter of fact goodness and painstaking, everyday religion.—Vale Advocate. (Rev. Royce is a brother of our Chas. Royce of Lone Rock.)

The first issue of the Sumpter News, published by F. J. Halleck, formerly of Heppner, has reached us. It is a very neat little paper, well filled with live advertisements, those of Ed W. Copner of Sumpter and Mont Downing of Bourne being among them. We wish the new paper success.

There is a possible chance of Durrant hanging, after all, providing he does not die of old age waiting for the event. The supreme court has refused to grant a new trial. Durrant has risen so much in the estimation of San Francisco journalists that his opinion is eagerly sought and loudly proclaimed by them.

To the surprise of nearly everybody, Governor Lord Saturday appointed Ex-U. S. Senator Henry W. Corbett, the Portland millionaire, U. S. Senator, to serve for the ensuing two years until J. H. Mitchell's successor is elected. The governor informs us that he will not call an extra session of the legislature, which many people will regret to learn.

Prineville certainly has an excellent public school. The Review says that out of 17 applicants at the recent teachers' examination, only one failed, and of the 16 who passed, 13 were pupils of the Prineville public school. The examinations are steadily being made more difficult for the avowed purpose of raising the standard, which surely needs it. Applicants to teach will hereafter be compelled to pass yet more difficult examinations than the last one, which was unusually hard.

Mr. and Mrs. Charley Burroughs, of Cherry Point, Illinois, arrived here Thursday, to make their home in this section. Mrs. Burroughs' brother, Billy Barr, met them at Arlington with private conveyance. Although this is the most disagreeable part of the year, they are well pleased with Oregon and their new home. Mr. Burroughs does not know yet what kind of business he will engage in, but will work at anything he can get to do for the present.

We learn that one of the defeated candidates for office last week feels considerably "put out," and threatens to have all who didn't vote for him expelled from the lodges and banished to Siberia. This is the worst case of big-head we have yet heard of, up to the hour of going to press. When a man gets the opportunity to such an extent that he is a standing candidate for anything and everything in sight, the voters can not be blamed for "sitting down on him."

At our school meeting Monday a resolution was introduced, recommending that the directors be instructed to employ a principal teacher for 9 months, and a primary teacher for 6 months, the services of the primary teacher to be continued the other 3 months in case the average attendance of the school exceeds 35 pupils. The object being to see whether or not they wanted the directors to employ two teachers at a salary of \$100 a month (for both) to teach 10 pupils each, during the last 3 months of the term.—Antelope Herald.

The ladies at Lone Rock, Gilliam county, have a secret society, which a correspondent of the Condon Globe in speaking of, called the ladies' Orientals. This called forth a protest from the society, in which the society is stated to be entirely different from what the Orientals are supposed to be. In closing the protest the writer says: "Our order is a respectable affair, and of a most honorable character and will stand investigation." And yet only a few weeks ago, if we are not mistaken, a couple of men of the neighborhood undertook to investigate the workings of the lodge from the attic, and the society would not stand it at all.—The Dalles Chronicle.

One of our last subscribers is James Henstin, of Poway, San Diego county, Cal., who formerly lived near Lone Rock. He concludes his letter as follows: "A few lines from me might interest my Gilliam county friends. I have rented a small ranch here of 90 acres, 30 of which are in fruit. We have a good prospect for a very large fruit and grain crop this year. This is the finest climate in the world. We have had no snow this winter and frost only one night hard enough to nip the potato tops a little. The only drawback here is a scarcity of water for irrigating purposes. Oranges and lemons grow here to perfection. We are well and hope all of our friends up there are in the same fix."

Banker Hurlburt made a flying business trip to Portland Monday.

The snow is all gone again and spring is here at last, we are glad to note.

Geo. Miller, the merchant, is sick this week. Russ Stillwell is running the store for him at present.

The Macabees here gave a "hayseed" party the other night, which outdone the average hayseed all-hollow.

Frank Cecil's body was not brought here for burial, as was expected, the burial having taken place in Wyoming.

Our band was out on the street March 4th, playing some fine inaugural music, to the delight of those who heard it.

Mr. Kirkland, who had intended to open a blacksmith shop here, changed his mind and has gone into partnership with J. P. Thomas at Olex.

While in Portland last week F. C. Hinkle procured some fine new music for the band. He says Sousa's famous band, now at Portland, isn't in it with our band—but of course it hasn't the backing and material that ours has.

In painting a house here if one tried to please everybody in color, it would have to appear like Joseph's coat—in many colors. It is a good deal like when there is a sick horse—everybody has a different remedy that is the best.

A show that was billed for Heppner Monday could not get there by rail, as there is no train service to that place on Sundays; so they telegraphed to Thompson and Binn and they came down and took the 13 comedians up in the Palace hotel bus.

J. W. Smith is having some kind of new-fangled oil put on the store floor, which prevents it from getting dirty and dusty, and no dust rises from it while sweeping, which will save a great deal of work. If it holds the dust down here in summer it is entitled to be rated as a miracle.

The town cows have been notified to not roam the streets at will after the 1st of the month. But some of the cows evidently took it as a joke or read the notice blear-eyed. Our marshal will put a bug in their ears one of these days, and the owners then notified to drop a dollar in the city's weasel-skin.

Trade has opened up here this spring better than for several years, and it is doubtful if there is a store between Portland and Spokane that is doing as large a business as J. W. Smith is doing right along. Banker Hurlburt says money is more plentiful than for several years and that he has about \$50,000 that will be paid out for sheep and cattle in this section this spring.
