While returning home from Arlington with a load of freight, Sam McGilvray of Mayville, met with a terrible accident early Wednesday morning while getting ready to start from the Downing ranch just north of town. In the attempt to couple the two wagons, his feet became entangled in the lines in such a manner as to hold him fast a second too long, and he was caught between, breaking his right shoulder bone. Manley Downing assisted him to town, where Dr. Hogan quickly reduced the fracture and he is resting as easy as could be expected. It is a most unfortunate accident, as he is a poor man with a family and will be incapacitated him for work all summer. He left for home this morning.

A Veal Supper that Failed to Connect.

One of the grandest and most beautiful things of nature is motherly devotion to her young. The editor of this excellent family paper saw a beautiful illustration of it while out for a stroll Tuesday evening, about one mile north of town. Two huge coyotes with appetites like a sawmill, by sneaking through the tall dead grass, singled out two young calves from their mothers, that were grazing with a small bunch of cattle. After running about two hundred yards the calves got through a barbed wire fence and lit out through the pasture, with the coyotes close at their heels, thinking what a delicious supper of veal they would have. At this instant the mothers, having missed their offspring, looked around and took in the situation at a glance. Each let out a bellow that could be heard a mile and started to the rescue at break-neck speed. It looked like it was a hopeless chase, for a strong 6-wire fence separated them from the fleeing calves, but when they reached it, each gave an unearthly bellow and plunged into the fence with a desperation that was astonishing. Fortunately several posts gave way, allowing them to get through, and in another moment, although badly cut and bleeding, they were licking and fondling their calves with as much devotion as a mother would caress her baby that had just been snatched from the jaws of death. The coyotes, which did not abandon their prey until the cows' hoofs were almost upon them, sneaked off to a knoll near by and continued to think about that fine veal supper that they didn't get.

To Byron Murch, Lydia Ann Murch, Henry C. Flower, Abram S. Hyatt and Osborn W. Bright, the above-named defendants: In the name of the State of Oregon you and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit on or before the first day of the next term of said court following the expiration of this summons, to-wit: By the

2d Monday in April, 1897, on the 12th day of said month of April, and if you fail so to appear and answer, the plaintiff for want thereof will apply to the court for the relief prayed for and demanded in the complaint herein, to-wit: Will take judgment against you for the sum of \$550.00, with interest thereon from the first day of December, 1894, at the rate of eight per cent per annum; the further sum of \$50.00 attorney's fees; the further sum of \$34.40 and interest thereon at the rate of eight per cent per annum from the first day of December, 1893; the further sum of \$33.40 and interest thereon from the first day of Dec., 1894, together with his costs and disbursements, and will take decree foreclosing the mortgage described in said complaint and declare the same to be a first lien upon the land therein described, to-wit: The southeast quarter of section twenty, township three south, of range twenty east, of the Willamette Meridian, situated in the County of Gilliam, State of Oregon; and that said defendants, Henry C. Flower, Abram S. Hyatt and Osborn W.
