The new law against passing counterfeit coins in brief may be explained that the law is in the main an extension of that against counterfeiting. It provides that the passing of mutilated or defaced coins or the mutilation or defacement of coin for any purpose shall be held to be a criminal offense, punishable by imprisonment for a period of one to five years and a fine of \$100 to \$2000. Under this law the practice of presenting ladies with coins of gold or silver with the initials of the donor engraved thereon, to be worn as bangles, will be a criminal offense. The law also drives out of existence a number of people who have made a living by purchasing mutilated coins at a reduction from their face value and plugging up the holes so skillfully that the original mutilation could not be discovered. Even this kind of tampering with money will be regarded as an offense under the statute.

The consolidation of all the cities of Manhattan Island into Greater New York has taken place and New York city has now a population of 3,100,000, being the second largest city in the world. London occupying first place. The city of New York has now a population greater than any state in the Union with the exception of Pennsylvania, Texas, Illinois, Missouri and Ohio, so the demand has arisen for the state of Manhattan, making the little island of Manhattan a state within itself, the smallest in area of the sisterhood of states, but one of the largest in population and greatest in commercial importance and wealth.

Arizona, anxious for new railroads, has enacted a law waiving taxes for 15 years on all roads built in the territory from now on. Railroads are a good thing until you get them. Then nothing is too mean to say about them, and no man is a sincere patriot unless he favors laws that will harass their business and keep them if possible from paying interest on their debts and wages to their workmen. We are with the railroads like the married and unmarried in the old epigram—out, we wish to be in; in, we wish to be out.—Oregonian.

The most valuable spots on the face of the earth are believed to be the four corners where Wall street touches Broad, in New York City. Not long ago \$1,500,000 was paid for five lots on Broadway, opposite Bowling Green. We advise our readers to not buy any such high-priced land for farming purposes, when you can get just as good land, with our fine climate thrown in, right around Condon for a couple of dollars an acre. Whatever you do, don't pay such outlandish prices as they hold their land at in New York City.

Another cyclone is reported down in Oklahoma territory, which wiped out the town of Chandler and killed a hundred or more persons.
