Miss Daisy Downing, who had been attending the state normal school at Weston, returned to Condon last week. She expects to leave soon for her home at Lawrence, Cal.

The anti-saloon element was knocked out in the city election at Goldendale last week, after a vigorous contest, and there'll be something to "wet up" with over there for another year at least.

Mrs. J. Egan of The Dalles, a sister of Mrs. S. S. Grider, arrived here Saturday on a month's visit with her relatives in this section. Del Rice met her at Arlington with private conveyance.

Dr. Hogan was called to the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Brown on Snipion creek Monday to prescribe for their bright little daughter Edna, who is sick with something similar to scarlatina or measles.

The tax levy this year amounts in all to 31 1/2 mills in Morrow county, as compared with 41 1/2 mills last year. This is a much needed reduction and will be appreciated much by our tax-ridden denizens.—*Gazette*.

Condon has never been so "dogged to death" and overrun by dogs as at present. They are of no earthly use to anybody and our city council ought to levy a tax of \$1 per head on them, like they do in every other incorporated town.

Tommy Livingston of Mayville is back in the clerk's office again, to remain until after circuit court. Claude Henshaw assisted with the work in the sheriff's office several days this week. The approach of circuit court always makes extra work in those offices.

The Morrow county Sheepshearers' Union met at Heppner last Saturday, and fixed the price of shearing for the coming season at 6 cents a head, including board and corral service. This is an advance of 1 cent over the price paid for shearing during the past two seasons.

The Hiram F. Nelson estate in Ferry Canyon was appraised Tuesday and amounts to between \$500 and \$600. W. N. Brown, J. M. Cameron and S. B. Couture were the appraisers. Frank Palmer was appointed administrator of the estate. See notice in this issue.

Ed Wineland, the well-known Lone Rock sawmill man, was in town several days last week making arrangements to establish a lumber and wood yard at Condon this spring. Charley Fix has been engaged to run the yard for him, on his lot just south of Johnson's livery stable.

John H. Tilly, who resides on the line between this and Crook counties, was over to town the first of the week procuring a "glory ticket" from Clerk Frazer, allowing him to marry a Miss Sachmiller, of the same neighborhood. No doubt by this time they are married and nearly well off already.

Wm. Meek went to Heppner this week and will assist his brother-in-law, W. P. Scrivner, in his shop several months.

The latest news from Washington is to the effect that H. W. Corbett will be seated, after all. Money is what counts—and the old fellow has lots of it.

Friday of this week is Arbor Day, and a program suited to the occasion will be rendered by the pupils of our public school, commencing at 2 o'clock p. m. Parents, encourage the children by coming out to hear them recite and sing. You can not spend an hour more pleasantly or profitably.

Seventy-five per cent of range cattle in Dakota, Montana, Wyoming and Minnesota have succumbed to the murderous winter. It is stated that Pierre, Wilboux of Dickinson, N. D., puts his losses at \$7,000,000. The 250,000 young Utah cattle he put on ranges last fall are all dead. This heavy loss of cattle cannot but make a shortage in the supply of beef this fall and should result in good prices prevailing.

To Byron Murch, Lydia Ann Murch, Henry C. Flower, Abram S. Hyatt and Osborn W. Bright, the above-named defendants: In the name of the State of Oregon you and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit on or before the first day of the next term of said court following the expiration of this summons, to-wit: By the
