Upon a long wagon, seated on either side, with their backs together, were seemingly a multitude of girls or young women, rugged, red-cheeked lasses. All wore dresses reaching to the knees, but not a shoe nor stocking in the entire load. Instead the sturdy limbs and feet were painted a dazzling carmine red, and these, swinging in the sunlight, produced an effect so weird as to be startling.

As the oxen waddled farther along, some enthusiastic Polk man discovered that the shapely limbs were stained with pokeberry juice, and cheers for "Polk and Dallas" rent the air. It is a picture that would startle the most daring agitator of to-day. But it was the spirit of the times.


