A learned gentleman discourses at length on the question whether criminals can be reclaimed. Probably some of them could be. But there is something which will pay much better than attempting to reform sinners already tough and hardened.

It has at last been determined that ex-Governor McGraw's shortage with King county, Washington, while acting as sheriff, amounts to almost \$9,000. Not having the ready cash to meet the demands of the county, he has executed a trust deed covering \$14,000 worth of property, and has been given five years in which to redeem the same.

An interesting point relative to the controversy over state taxes is that brought out by The Dalles Chronicle, which says: "The law provides that if a county treasurer holds back the money for 20 days he forfeits 20 per cent of the money held back, and if he holds it out 60 days he is a defaulter, punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary."

The "Japs" are coasting about for a supply of cavalry horses, and the Japanese consul at Portland says that our cayuses will just fill the bill. If the home government agrees with him we may find a market for our surplus horse flesh at fair prices.

War between Greece and Turkey is inevitable, as both have already declared war. And our farmers are sowing every available acre to spring wheat, well knowing that in case of a general European war, which is quite probable, wheat will bring \$1.50 per bushel before another harvest.

At the trial of a couple in Kansas who were living together as man and wife, without marriage, the only defense offered was that as Adam and Eve had set the example by doing the same thing, they could see no harm in it. But the jury took another view of it.

If the German emperor ever gets hold of the wretches who started the reports that he is insane it will go hard with them. He will probably either hang them up by the toes a day or two or compel them to sit down and listen to one of his most violent cornet solos.

The corporations are falling over themselves to shower favors upon ex-Secretary Carlisle. He is attorney for the J. P. Morgan syndicate and it is said his income from this source alone will reach \$100,000 a year.

In the war between Turkey and Greece, the sympathy of the world is with plucky little Greece, which is battling against fearful odds, perhaps ten to one. But it will not be long before some other country jumps in and helps to wipe Turkey off the face of the earth.
