It is noticed that the Turks invariably have the advantage in the afternoon dispatches, and the Greeks regain their lost ground and make formidable progress in their campaign in those of the morning. This is for the same reason that the Spaniards invariably win in Havana and the Cubans in Key West dispatches. The Turks get their news to London by the overland telegraph, in time for the afternoon papers. The Greek dispatches have to go by cable across the Adriatic to Italy, and so on through France, and reach London in time only for the morning papers. Victory in modern war consists in reaching the telegraph office first.—Oregonian.

A Cook county farmer recently went to a real estate agent and offered to trade his farm for city lots. The agent was all business and was in for a trade at once. "I want to show you," he said, "a block of the finest lots anywhere in Chicago. They are centrally located and cheap as sawdust. Get into my buggy and I'll take you out to see them." They drove out and looked at the lots and the agent expatiated at great length upon the advantages of their location and finally said: "Now, when can I have a look at your farm?" "I'll show it to you presently," said the farmer, "it's about ten miles back on the road between here and town."

Washington Post: Representative Ellis of Oregon wants to dispose of two consulships. His candidates are Chas. H. Dodd, a former president of the board of trade of Portland, who desires the post at Kanagawa, Japan; and Hon. J. F. Caples, who retired last year in the district convention in favor of Mr. Ellis for the congressional nomination. He will be satisfied with any good-paying consulate. Ellis is urging the appointment of J. W. Ivey of Portland as collector of customs in Alaska, and of A. S. Maxwell, who wants to be appraiser at the port of Portland.

The supreme court of the United States has affirmed the decision of the supreme court of the state of Washington, in the tax cases against the national banks. The question involved was the right of King county and the city of Seattle to tax the shares of a bank itself, instead of assessing the tax to the individual owners. The suit was brought to recover taxes assessed against the banks for 1892. The decision affirms the right under the state law to assess the bank as a representative of the stockholders to the extent of its stock.

The Turks are the most fearless fighters in the world—nothing but death can stop their advance. Mahomet taught them centuries ago that the Moslem who died fighting for the holy empire would go directly to the seventh heaven without any civil service examination as to his previous good character. That is why the Turk in battle goes in to win or die, and for that reason they are termed "fatalists," believing that if their time has come to die they will die anyway.

It is said that nearly every man takes a longer stride with the right leg than the left, and that in walking a mile the left leg is eighty-eight feet short of the distance covered by its mate. If a man walks five miles a day the shortage in a year is about thirty miles. This is one of the leaks that troubles the arithmetic man far more than the pedestrian.

The Greeks call their native country Hellas. Since they have been thrashed now, it is likely they will drop the last two letters of Hellas.

There seems to be too much Turkey for the quantity of Greece to fry it in.

The latest dispatches are to the effect that the Greeks have given up the fight and consider themselves thoroughly whipped. This leads the Salem Statesman to say: There is hope that the flush of success will make Turkey so cocky that she will run up against one of the big nations and get wiped off the map of the world.

The Heppner Gazette hits all those whose signatures appear on a petition recently sent to Washington, asking that Corbett be seated as senator, a hard jolt, as follows: "The whole outfit are a lot of bolters and soreheads, not worthy the notice of republicans in Washington or anywhere else."

Greece has a population of 2,187,208, with an area of 24,977 square miles, and is more thickly populated than any other country in Europe, except Sweden and Prussia. Only about 20,000 profess any religion other than the orthodox. Turkey has a population of about 35,000,000.
