Fire At Arlington.

Mrs. Clarence Shurte With Her Two Children Meet Death.

The sad news of the death of Mrs. Clarence Shurte and her two children reached Condon Tuesday morning. It is reported that a lamp exploded quite late in the evening after the family had retired for the night, and Mr. Shurte ran for the small hose to quench the fire. Mrs. Shurte's first thought was of their two small children, and, putting a quilt over her head to protect her face from the heat, she rushed into the bedrooms where the children were sleeping and did not come out again, and her husband called to her but received no answer. By this time the fire company was on hand and, on learning that Mrs. Shurte and the two children were inside, rushed in to rescue them. They found Mrs. Shurte lying on the floor dead; she had become blinded by the smoke and could not find her way out of the house. The firemen took Mrs. Shurte and the two children outside and it was found that the children were also dead. There was no blaze in the room where they were found, they had suffocated from the smoke which had filled the room. Miss French, a lady who was sleeping up stairs, managed to escape by dropping from the balcony.

Mr. Clarence Shurte, husband of the unfortunate woman, is well known in Gilliam county, and has been the head business manager and book keeper in J. W. Smith's store at Arlington for the past ten years, and his many friends in Condon feel the deepest sympathy for him in the loss of his beloved wife and children.
