The Indian who tried to carry our paper over Chilkooot pass had the misfortune to stub his toe, which started him tobogganing down a declivity of seven miles into Death Canyon. He did not rejoin the party. We are indebted to Soapine Sam, our genial grocer, for the loan of a ream of wrapping paper on which to print this issue."
