DEATH OF JOHN SING.

On Saturday, Aug. 21st, the spirit of John Sing passed into the unknown land, from whence none have ever returned. The immediate cause of his death was quick consumption. Mr. Sing was an old Union soldier, and a pensioner. He was born in Sevierville Co., Tenn., and was about 54 years of age at the time of his death. Mr. Sing left Tennessee about two years ago and came with his family to Oregon and settled on a farm two miles south of Condon, which place he had resided ever since. He belonged to the 8th Tennessee Infantry and had a record of good service. His remains were interred in Condon cemetery on Sunday, Aug. 22nd. He had a host of friends in this section who are grieved to hear of his death and deeply sympathize with the mourning family in their sad bereavement.
