The case of the Northern Pacific Ry. Co. against settlers, involving the title to 130,000 acres of land in the overlap grant in Klickitat county, and 100,000 acres in Umatilla, Gilliam, Morrow and Sherman counties, has been decided in favor of the settlers.

Among the latest here who have purchased instruments from Jacobson are: C. A. Danneman, a fine "Valley Gem" piano; T. G. Johnson, one of those magnificent "Ludwig" pianos; Geo. Gibbons, Miss Jennie Baiding and Howard Propet each a fine organ.

Dr. H. P. Howard and A. G. Ogilvie of Fossil expect to start East about next Thursday, the former to join his wife at Prince Edward's Island, and the latter to visit his old home in England until about March 1st. Dr. Howard may conclude to go to Klondike next spring.

J. D. Livingston's brother-in-law, R. B. Dixon, of Roseburg, has just been appointed supervisor of the forest reserve in this state, by the president—a position worth about \$2500 a year. Neither of them—Bent Mires, Dr. Lamberson or Chas. Hilton have yet received the plums they are looking for.

F. M. Pliter has traded his town property, just back of the Globe office, to Mr. D. C. Downer for his fine 200-acre farm on Rock creek, Pliter paying \$6000 to boot. Mr. and Mrs. Downer expect to move into their new home in about a month, and their many friends here will be pleased to have them as neighbors.

Mr. Henry DeMoss plays two tunes on an organ while he sings another. He also plays bass horn and drum at once. Mr. George DeMoss plays duets on two cornets, the two parts clear and distinct. He also plays guitar and banjo, cornet and snare drum, two drums, etc. At the church in Condon this (Friday) evening. Don't miss it.

B. F. Childers, who was arrested in Dillon, Mont., a few weeks ago as being Jack Hamblet, the murderer of Ben Gammy, in Grant county, in 1894, is on his way back home. Childers was taken to Canyon City by Sheriff Livingston, and, after proper inquiry, he was discharged, scores of people who were well acquainted with Hamblet proclaiming Childers not the man wanted.

The ball Friday night, given by the Arion Club, of Arlington, was one of the most delightful events of the kind ever given here. The music was by far the best ever heard at a ball at Condon, and was a rare treat for those who heard it. The orchestra is composed of R. H. Benedict, pianist and conductor; Joel Pound, cornetist; H. Kerby, violinist; E. D. Hatch, clarinet; F. T. Harbison, baritone player. They play music that would sound all right in any first-class theatre.

A meeting of the Sheepmen's Protective Union was held at Condon Tuesday for the purpose of settling up the coyote bounty accounts, etc. About \$170 was paid in by the members, leaving about \$800 yet of the amount necessary, and this is expected to be paid in by Nov. 1st, this fall. All of the members are urgently requested to pay in their assessments before that date, as no money can be paid out until all is paid in. Morrow county sheepmen have made up a fund of \$1000 for the purpose of sending detectives into Grant county to ferret out and prosecute the parties who have been shooting sheep over there, and the Sheepmen's Union of Gilliam county propose to raise a similar amount for the same purpose. Some of those sheep-shooting smart-alecks will learn that they do not own the earth yet, and that the U. S. government has some say yet in those matters.

The Races Friday and Saturday

A large crowd was out and intense interest was manifested in the horse racing that took place at Condon last week.

The saddle horse race Friday at 11 o'clock was the first on the program. The entries were, "Cland," owned by Jim Cordell; "Domino," by E. A. May; "Bally," by Roy Ebbert; "Ruth," by John Maddock. Cordell's racer won easily, with "Domino" 2d and "Bally" 3d.

At 3 p. m. the free for all 300 yds. race was run, the entries being, "Too Big," by Otho Ward; "Striker," by Palmer & Harrison; "Daisy," by J. E. Downer; "Gold-digger," by Horn Bros.; "Bill," by Gene Glesan. "Too Big" proved not only too big, but too much for them, and ran like a deer with a split stick over its tail, and came out away ahead, with "Striker" 2d and "Daisy" 3d.

After this came a match race between Geo. Earhart's horse "Joe" and Geo. Duke's mare "Brownie" for a bet of \$50 a side. About \$300 changed hands on this race, which was intensely exciting. The little mare won by only six inches, and a shout went up that could be heard for miles.

The first on Saturday was a pony race, 300 yds; the entries being: "Bally," by Ebbert; "Ruth," by Frank Maddock; "Trifle," by Geo. Schott; "Dandy," by Geo. Earhart; "Digger," by Bill Searey. This was a close race, "Bally" coming under the wire first, "Ruth" 2d, and "Dandy" 3d.

The principal race of all, and which excited the most interest, was the free for all 1/2-mile dash on Saturday evening, the entries being: "Miss McKinley," by John Putnam; "Too Big," by Otho Ward; "Daisy," by J. E. Downer; "Gold-digger," by Horn; "Striker," by Palmer. This was one of the prettiest races ever run in this county, all of the five horses getting an even start and all running almost neck and neck until within about 100 yds. of the outcome, when Putnam's little mare, rode by himself, shot ahead like a cannon ball and won by several lengths, (time, 27 seconds) while the crowd went wild for a few minutes. Several hundred dollars changed hands on this race, and no one was better pleased with the result than was John Maddock, who won considerable money, besides "Miss McKinley," a colt of his well-known stallion, "Frank Hastings." In this race "Too Big" came out 2d and "Daisy" 3d.
