Juneau Townsite Contest Settled.

The following dispatch from Port Townsend to the S. F. Examiner, dated Sept. 26th, shows that Tommy Lyons is fully "onto his job" and takes to his work like a duck to water:

"A private dispatch received here tonight from Washington by a prominent mining man, a resident of Juneau, Alaska, announces that a United States patent for 140 acres of the Juneau townsite has finally been issued from the United States Land office. Seventy acres is excluded from the grant, that amount being filed on as mineral claim. The patent issues to townsite trustee T. E. Lyons, of Heppner, Or. This ends the contest pending since 1881 and is considered to mean much for the advancement of Juneau."
