The present managers of the Butte Creek saw mill (Messrs. Hendricks & Steiwer, with P. L. Stewart foreman at the mill) are endeavoring to get out 500,000 feet of lumber this fall for the coming spring trade. They now have most all kinds of seasoned lumber for the fall trade. Their prices and quality of lumber, and good roads, are bringing them an immense trade. The mill is running at its full capacity, averaging about 15,000 feet daily.

The two trainrobbers who held up the O R & N train near Portland two weeks ago, have just been sentenced to 31 years each in the penitentiary. One of the robbers is over 50 years of age and the other about 30. They should have been sent up for life.

Wm. Smith, the well-known and prosperous sheepman of Hay creek, on the John Day river, has just purchased all of Wm. Kenny's land, 320 acres. Mr. Smith now owns 1480 acres of the best land in that portion of the country, and is one of the most successful sheepmen in Oregon. We have not learned what Mr. Kenny intends to do.

County Superintendent Phillips of Colfax, Wash., is advertising for school teachers, as there are a dozen school districts in Whitman county without teachers. The salary offered varies from \$30 to \$45 a month, and the terms from 2 1/2 to 6 months. The abundance of work and good wages in other occupations has caused most of the teachers to desert the schools.

Hon. J. E. David, representative of this county, recently put in his claim for salary at the last so-called meeting of the legislature, demanding pay for the full forty days. Secretary Kincaid, however, refuses to pay the bill until the next legislature meets and makes an appropriation or passes an act authorizing the payment of the salaries of the men who held up the legislature.

The severe attack of pneumonia that Columbus Grider had last spring while in the mountains, left his lungs in a weak and dangerous condition. Acting upon the advice of his friends, he left this week for the tropical climate of Southern California, where he expects to remain a year or two in the hope of regaining his health. He may conclude to go to Honolulu or Hawaii.

On the 11th of this month the federal supreme court took up the Durrant case. On its decision hang three other California appeals, and several Washington cases will virtually be settled by it. The appeals have no inherent merit. The only real question to be decided is whether the states need delay the execution of the judgments of their courts pending such vexatious and purely dilatory appeals.

James Campbell, a brother of our Wm. Campbell, arrived here last week from Aurora, Ill., on a visit to his brother and family. He heard of this portion of Oregon being the healthiest place in the United States, and as his health has not been good for some time, he has concluded to have his family come out and locate in this section. Wilson of Astoria came up to Condon last week to dispose of the balance of their furniture, etc., which had been left here, and to take back with her this week a number of articles that they left behind when they moved to Astoria recently. Mr. and Mrs. Wilson conduct a confectionery store, wholesale and retail, and ice cream parlor at Astoria and are doing well, and are much pleased with their new home. Charley expects to come up to Condon about next week to remain a week or so and collect some saloon accounts yet due him.

Jay P. Lucas, former county clerk of this county, was married yesterday to an accomplished young lady of Baker City, whose name we have not learned. His relatives here, County Clerk Frazer and wife, left the first of the week to join Jay and his new bride in Portland, where they will all visit with relatives several days. Mr. and Mrs. Lucas will reside in North Yakima, where Jay holds the position of head book-keeper in the enormous wholesale and retail store of Coffin Bros., who employ 26 men to run their business. Jay's friends in this county—which means everybody who knows him—join the GLOBE in hearty congratulations.

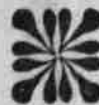
