Lone Rock Rumbings.

Our day school seems to be progressing nicely under the management of Prof Stratton.

Next Sunday and Monday is the time of the quarterly meeting of the M. E. church at this burg.

P L Ham and R M Johnson returned from Portland Sunday, where they had been attending the Grand Lodge K of P.

R G Robinson has bought several head of Hereford calves from D H Smith, of Thirtymile, at \$25 per head. Pretty lively price for heifer calves.

S B Barker was up in this vicinity lately looking after sheep range. We understand he has bought some land here with a view of establishing a sheep camp.

Nat Webb is on a trade with a sheep buyer by the name of Wright, for a band of old ewes at \$2 per head. The same sheep this time last year would not have brought \$1 per head.

P L Ham has "taken a tumble" to business at last, and has his store chock full of A1 goods at reasonable prices. He is doing a big business. Varilly, Lone Rock is liable to "boil and run over" yet.

The farmers of this locality are quite busy putting in their fall crops. Andrew Neel and Jeff Hayes have just purchased one of Clark's Right-Lap Plow and Seeder combined, for which they paid \$75. They say it does fine work.

Jerry Vickers got in from the Greenhorn country the first of the week with Hayes Bros sheep. Jerry says all the boys were glad to get out of the mountains this fall, as feed was pretty scarce. Besides, the ranchers out there are in the habit of using shepherders for marks to try their guns on, instead of putting spots up on the trees, as used to be the custom.

Beecher Flat Notes.

Cool weather once more. J M Carl has commenced hauling his wheat to Arlington. He has to haul two and three parts of loads to the stage road and there reload all onto one wagon. The roads are bad and have not been worked this year.

B K Searcy & Co. have finished threshing grain on Beecher for this season, the wheat averaging 25 bushels to the acre. Mr Searcy plowed 40 acres, sowed the same, cut 60 tons of hay, and threshed 3,489 bushels of as fine grain as a man wants to look at. He sowed a small patch of the new kind of oats, called the "dry weather" oats. He cut and threshed 548 bushels of it. It makes the Beecherflaters look down their noses to think of the heavy taxes they have to pay and 25,000 bushels of grain to haul off and no roads to get out on, without having to travel from 15 to 20 miles before they can start to Arlington. There has not been one lick of work done on our roads since the new road system went into effect. Beecher flaters say "look out Mr County Court, or there will be a break in the republican line that will surprise the natives, and don't forget it." It is high time the roads were put in repair. Little did we think when we read the prophetic warning from different parts of the county, published in the GLOBE, that the work would all be done from Fossil to Arlington only, and around their vicinity. But alas, how true. We, the taxpayers, will pay you on the back, County Court, for your kind forethought of us—but it will be when you step down and out. The taxpayers are "laying for you." When a man holds an office of that kind too long there is danger of his getting the big-head to such an extent as to imagine he owns the earth and that nobody has any rights but himself.
