His many friends will be pleased to learn that Charley Gross was discharged last week from the insane asylum at Salem, as cured. He arrived here Friday, and after visiting a couple of days, left to join his family at Adams, Unatilla county.

Sheriff Matlock of Heppner was over in this section last Wednesday looking for a young man named Johnson, who is wanted over in Morrow county for stealing wheat, or something of that sort. He lost trace of the fugitive in this county and returned home without him.

The Fossil paper's misrepresentation last week about the Globe and Gazette editors' social relations reminds us of "Rocky Mountain" Smith's description of the Fossil editor when he stated in the Mitchell paper: "The big burly nigger couldn't tell the truth if he was wanted to."

Condon will soon have a new Congregationalist preacher. Rev. Clapp, presiding elder, has concluded to appoint a minister for this place, providing \$200 per year is paid him by our people, and as nearly all of that amount is already subscribed, it is likely the appointment will be made soon.

Chas. Habeshon, the young Austrian who recently came out from Nebraska, is still busy building brick flues in Condon and does the neatest work in that line that we have yet seen in the county. His price is \$1.50 per foot and he furnishes the brick and everything, even what carpenter work is necessary.

A week ago last Sunday while Charley Lillie was on his way to Arlington with a load of hogs, the end-gate came out at 30-mile and 3 of them got away. They are all very fat, black, about one year old, swallow fork in left ear and half upper crop in right ear. The finder will be paid for his trouble and expense of keeping.

C. L. Lillie of Mayville informs us that his son Charley, aged 13, is progressing nicely with his studies in the Grass Valley Baptist Academy and that he is greatly pleased with the school. He makes his home with the principal, Rev. Hargrave, and writes that it is no wonder he is learning so fast, as he begins at 7 o'clock in the morning and has to study till 9 o'clock at night.

J. W. Leslie, a prosperous, young sheepman of Comstock Basin on upper 30 mile, last week sold to C. W. White 300 ewes at \$2.50 per head. This is the best price we have heard of this season. The same sheep last year sold for \$1.25 per head. The sheepmen this fall wear a different smile from that of the last four years, and everybody else in this section rejoice with them in their good fortune.

Mrs. H. B. Hendricks met with quite an accident Tuesday. She and Mrs. J. K. Fitzwater were out driving when their horse reared up and turned around, upsetting their buggy. Mrs. Fitzwater had already jumped out, and Mrs. Hendricks in trying to get out was caught in the lines and thrown violently to the ground against a barbed wire fence. She was pretty badly scratched and bruised up, but not seriously hurt.

The decision of Judge Bradshaw that county courts have no authority of law to impose any penalty on delinquent taxes, other than the necessary costs of levy and state property, will result in the return of the money, already collected as penalty to the taxpayers. The death of L. Lafferty at Arlington Sunday night was a great surprise to his relatives and friends. He had been troubled all summer with paralysis, but had recovered sufficiently to be able to haul wheat, which was his errand to Arlington last Friday. Geo. Crawford accompanied him, and on Sunday evening he started out to notify Mr. Lafferty's family of his fatal sickness, but before the news reached them the husband and father was cold in death and buried at Arlington. All that medical aid and kind friends could do was done for him at Arlington, but to no avail. He leaves a wife and two children, one grown daughter and a little child, who reside at the Vancleave ranch on Trailfork.

Preparations are being made for a big ball at Olex on Thanksgiving.

Mrs. H. D. Randall and children have moved to Arlington to remain till spring.

Teamsters say the roads just now are in worse condition than they have ever been.

Judge Mariner passed through town Monday on his wheel. We suppose he is out inspecting the condition of our roads under the cash system.

Tom Malanaphy is in full charge of the store and postoffice during Mr. L. O. Ralston's absence, and the result is, all the young ladies call twice a day for mail.

Miss Maud Smith, who had been attending school in the Willamette valley, arrived home last week, and is now numbered among the pupils of our school.

There seems to be a great deal of sickness in this part. T. C. Mobley and Miss Mary Huber have been on the sick list but we are glad to note that they are improving.

L. O. Ralston and family departed for Albany last Thursday in response to a message stating that his mother was very low and not likely to recover. Mrs. Ralston expects to remain at Albany for some time with her relatives, but Lou is expected home in a few days. Later.

Atty. John Lyons Will Leave Condon.

His many friends in this county and throughout the state will learn with regret that Attorney John Lyons will soon leave Condon and Oregon. He will leave here in about two weeks to join his brother Tom at Juneau, Alaska, town-site commissioner at Juneau, where they will engage in the practice of law on an extensive scale. The prospect there for a large and lucrative law practice is very good, and Lyons Bros. are sure of getting the "Lyons' share" of it, as both are as full of energy as an egg is of meat.

Mr. Lyons has been our postmaster since spring, and his leaving will necessitate a change in that office. He has resigned the office in favor of John Reischer, who has already received letters of endorsement from a number of prominent politicians, and all of our citizens have signed his petition for the appointment, all of which will be forwarded at once to Washington. Just as soon as his commission arrives he will move the office into his harness shop—a very convenient location.

Arlington Items.

Wheat is selling at 68½ cts this week.

Mrs. M. J. Canty has been dangerously sick for several days.

Several shows took in the town last week. Arlington has the name of being a good show town.

Mrs. E. B. Comfort is visiting her brother at Salem, H. B. Holland, manager of the Salem flouring mill.

Smythe shipped one trainload of sheep last week and would have shipped another but could not get cars.

The water Co sold their old boiler to a Portland man the other day and shipped it down the first of the week.

Joe Teft killed 50 geese one day last week. Had he not run out of ammunition he would have bagged a lot of them.

S. G. Hawson took in the town last Sunday disguised as a tramp. He says he got several handouts and promises of several kickouts, and that he had more fun than shooting at a decoy duck.

We understand there is a trainload of sheep at The Dalles waiting for cars. The stock cars seem to be back East somewhere just now and shippers are being disappointed very much all along the line.

Harry Clay started to Huntington last Friday where he has a trainload of sheep that he summered out at Stein's mountain. He expects to feed them in Nebraska and put them on the market in the early spring.

There was quite a stir among the tin-horn gamblers here last week when some of them got pulled. But there was a screw loose somewhere and everything was made right, the fines remitted, and we guess confidence has been restored in that line once more.

Mr. L. Lafferty came to town last week from the Trailfork country, and while here took sick on Friday night with a paralytic stroke and died Sunday night at the Grande hotel. There was some trouble getting word to his folks, who live on Trailfork, and none of them were present at his death or for several days after. The body was taken in charge by J. H. Wood, the undertaker, awaiting orders from them. At this writing (Tuesday) the burial has not yet taken place.

A crew of men are setting the poles and stringing the wire between here and Heppner. They build about four miles a day. The poles are 25 feet long and came from Idaho; are very large and will last many years. The line should have gone to Condon and Fossil, instead of Heppner, as it would have tapped a country that is badly in need of either telegraph or telephone service. We believe the company can be induced to build a line out north if the right men take the matter in hand promptly.
