Wheat is still on the rise.

Smythe says the 1400 herd of sheep he shipped east got through in good shape.

W C Brown last Tuesday shipped one car of fine mules from this place to Kansas City, which has always been a good mule market.

Dr. Gelsendorfer, of this place, and Dr. Rudy, of The Dalles, will open joint offices in The Dalles and Arlington within two weeks.

The first fire alarm for a long time was sounded here Monday evening, the old Gilmore hotel building having caught fire, but was extinguished before the hose cart got there.

R T Cox returned this week, after disposing of most of his bucks in the south end of the county, having sold over 500 head. He says, "if you have anything to sell, advertise it."

We regret to announce that Mrs W H Colwell is sick, and her doctor advises her to be taken to a hospital in Portland and an operation performed for a tumor. She will be taken to the city in a few days and will perhaps have to remain in the hospital a month or so.

Messrs Collins and Cooke, of the Junction House, made things hum for awhile here last week, lawing over a wire fence that some one cut. Collins had Cooke arrested on a state charge, but did not make it stick—and of course the taxpayers will have to foot the bills, which by rights should be taxed up to Collins.

The people of Gilliam county will be glad to learn that Jay P. Lucas will soon return to this county again to reside, having accepted a position with Lord & Co. as book-keeper. Jay's many friends have hoped ever since he left here three years ago that he would return to the county, and their wishes in that respect will soon be gratified.

Fremont Wade of Clem met with a terrible accident Tuesday, in which he almost lost his life. He was on his way to Arlington with a load of wheat and on Shuttler Flat he either fell off or was thrown from his wagon, rendering him unconscious. His team came on, and it was some time before Geo Welshons came along and found the poor fellow, still unconscious, and brought him to town, also his team. It is not yet known how badly he is hurt.

School Supt. Daggett has developed into a skunk hunter of no mean dimensions, and has earned a reputation in that respect that is indeed "enviable."
