Death of Mrs. Colwell.

It was with extreme sadness that our people learned of the death of Mrs. W. H. Colwell, which occurred at the Good Samaritan hospital in Portland on Monday afternoon.

A tumor recently formed in her right side and grew so rapidly that within a month it had grown to an enormous size, perhaps 16 pounds in weight. Upon the advice of her physicians, she was taken to the hospital at Portland last Saturday and Monday at 11 o'clock a very dangerous operation was performed upon her and the tumor removed. At first it was thought she would rally, but the terrible strain upon her weak and nervous constitution was too great to overcome, and she died at 2:30 p. m. The body was shipped to Arlington and buried Wednesday.

Mrs. Colwell's maiden name was Miss Jennie Jones, and was born and raised in Washington county, this state. She was a refined and educated lady, and taught school after growing up to womanhood; and it was while teaching at Lone Rock that she first met her future husband. They never had any children of their own, but for several years have been keeping three of her dead sister's little girls—Louise, Gerty and Orpha Geranoff. At the time of her death Mrs. Colwell was about 40 years of age, and besides a husband and her relatives she leaves a host of friends who deeply mourn her untimely death.

Robinson owns the plant, and has secured from the city council an exclusive franchise for 20 years. The power is furnished by the Arlington Water Co.

Although the bulk of the wheat raised in Gilliam county remains unsold, it is pretty certain that much of it will go on the market within the next 30 days. Many farmers have held their grain in hopes of a better price, but it is generally believed that the wheat market has seen its best figures for this season, and that a change in the price will be for the worse rather than for the better. Up to this time something like a quarter of a million bushels of wheat has been marketed at this place, with a much greater volume still to come. Gilliam's wheat crop this year is not less than 1,500,000 bushels, nearly all of which will find an outlet here.
