Miss Mary Maddock left today for Pendleton to attend the St. Joseph Academy. Sister Superior of Pendleton, who had been visiting here several days, accompanied Miss Maddock.

We omitted to state last week that Mrs. T. G. Johnson won a prize at the ball here Thursday night in a contest for the best round dancing. A great many couples competed for the prize.

New goods are arriving almost daily for S. B. Barker's store, which has been doing an enormous business all summer and fall. Another clerk, M. O. Clarke, has lately been added to his force, and he will likely be forced to employ another man before long if his business keeps on increasing.

It now turns out that D. A. Vance and Ed Copner became hopelessly involved in debt with their store at Sumpter and were forced to make an assignment, and have turned over the property for the benefit of creditors. The Baker City papers say that Copner has left the state to avoid helping to settle up the business.

Our city council has fallen into line with Heppner and other neighboring towns in the reform move, and last Friday ordered that no more gambling or games of chance be run within the city limits of Condon, and ordered the marshal to clear the city of the "tin-horn" element. This order has caused quite a hub-bub among the sporting fraternity. Bill Livingston has resigned the position of city marshal, as he thinks he would have quite a job on his hands if he undertook to "pull" everyone who backs at games of chance, and says he would not like the idea of depopulating the town entirely, as the order includes dice-shaking, baking powder lotteries, nickel-in-the-slot machines, raffling and every other game of chance. No one has yet been appointed to fill the vacancy.

Dr. B. F. Nott, dentist, writes us that he will be in Olex until Dec. 5th, and then come to Condon, where he will remain until Jan. 1st.

A prominent capitalist who was recently offered for \$75,000 an interest in a Klondike scheme warranted to pay \$100,000 a month from the start, responded with this message: "Pay for it out of the first month's earnings. Send the surplus at once." The negotiation failed to go through.

One of the greatest needs of Condon at present is more house room, both dwelling and business houses, but especially the former. Every available room in town is occupied and a great demand for more is increasing daily. It is to be regretted, for the town's sake, that all those who have been in business here for any length of time have not identified themselves with or taken sufficient interest in the town to build residences for themselves. The man who will invest money in the construction of a number of cottages in Condon will realize from the rents and sales thereof a greater interest on his investment than from any other enterprise we could suggest. Little three and four-room cottages that can be built at a cost not to exceed \$200 each will bring from \$5 to \$8 per month rent. There is a great opportunity for speculation along this line in Condon at present and the first man in the field will get the rake-off. There is 50 per cent interest in the investment.

Lone Rock Rumblings.

Most all the stock in the country were fed through the last 10 days' storm.

A heavy fall of rain Monday night took all the snow off and the weather is bright and warm again.

Four 4-horse teams came over from the Winlock country last week loaded with wheat and onions. They sold all of their produce in this locality and went on to Heppner and brought back freight for P L Ham's store. John Ahalt and Frank Sechrist were among them. They sold wheat for 55 cts per bushel.

Rev Wilburn closed his 3-weeks' revival meeting at this place last week, without a single conversion. But it did produce the biggest church wrangle that was ever known in this place. We think if the Rev gentleman would take a trip to Klondike he could perhaps bulldoze himself rich, as bulldozing seems to be his strongest point.
