Ray Smith and Miss Mary Quinn were married at her home on Willow creek, Crook county, on Nov. 21st.

Ed F. McConnell orders his Globe changed from Mayville to Wynore, Nebraska, where he started for this week.

Mrs. E. Meek left the first of this week for a visit to her relatives in California and Kansas, and will not return until spring.

August Anderson has been appointed city marshal of Condon, at a salary of \$20 a month and \$1.50 a day extra for street work, etc.

Has Sulpes of The Dalles arrived here yesterday to remain a couple of weeks after his land and cattle interests at Matney Flat.

The Oregonian says that Mrs. M. H. Goddard, in charge of the sixth grade of the Holladay school, has resigned on account of ill health.

W. W. Oglesby has instituted a suit in the Lane county circuit court against D. C. Gibson for the sum of \$68.75 on a promissory note.—Eugene Guard.

Miss Florence Davidson has begun teaching a 3-months' term of school on Matney Flat. They say Steve Fletcher is aspiring for the position of assistant teacher.

Dr. Lannerberg, the Eye Specialist, writes us from Fossil that he is so rushed with work over there that he cannot come to Condon before next Wednesday, 15th, and will remain until Friday, 17th.

Mr. J. W. Maxwell of Lakeview, a representative of Christy & Wile of San Francisco, was in this county this week, interviewing our sheepmen in regard to a new-fangled sheep dip that the firm has for sale.

A hobo broke into Atty. W. H. Wilson's law office at The Dalles Wednesday night and stole his fine typewriter, worth \$100, pawned it for \$3 and then skipped the town. Mr. Wilson got his machine again after a long hunt.

The sheep trespass case of C. W. White vs. Tim Connolly, is being tried by a jury in Justice Tatom's court at Condon this week. L. W. Darling is counsel for plaintiff and H. B. Hendricks for defendant. Case went to trial at 1 p. m. today.

David Bowman, a young man who came up last week from near Dallas, Polk county, has purchased D. A. Dodson's Rd. right on "Poverty Flat," near Clem. Mr. Bowman is a first-class blacksmith and may open a shop at Condon soon.

Eight thousand bushels of wheat were sold at Heppner Wednesday at 64 cents. T. J. Davidson, of Gooseberry, sold 5800 bushels of this amount. He raised about 11,000 bushels of wheat this season and will use the remainder of his crop to fatten hogs and feed sheep.

His friends will regret to learn that Judge Mariner's fine wheat farm and orchard at Blalock will soon be sold at sheriff's sale, to satisfy a mortgage held by the Jarvis-Conkling Mortgage Co. The principal, interest, attorney fees, costs and all amounts to nearly \$10,000.

Winnu Keltur left Monday for Bluff, Lane county, where his father owns some good-paying gold mines. Winnu will try his luck there until spring and if he doesn't strike anything to suit him he will go to Alaska. Frank Labous and Jack Hanley of this place are also preparing to go to Klondike next spring.

Our city narrowly escaped what might have been a terrible fire Saturday morning. Chas. Fix was warming a large open can of tar on his heating stove, when it boiled over and at once ignited. He grabbed the can and started for the door, but was forced to drop it, and in an instant the floor and doors were enveloped in flames. The cry of fire soon brought every man in town to the scene with a bucket of water, but before they all arrived, the fire was extinguished by a Ferrell's Fire Extinguisher in the hands of Ed Moore. There was a strong wind at the time and, had the fire got a start, every building on Main street would have gone up in smoke.

Rev. Holt, accompanied by Mr. Goodwin, representing the Latter day Saint church, has been preaching here for the past week. Rev. Holt is a good talker and is quite certain of having large audiences as long as he remains here.

Fate appears to be against Mrs. Sophia McKinney of Goldendale, whose husband died at Lone Rock last winter, leaving her three small children to provide for. Friday evening her house and all its contents burned at Goldendale, also a lot of clothing and a cellar full of fruit and vegetables belonging to her father, Capt. S. H. Miller.
