Juneau Lots on the Market.

A dispatch from Juneau, under date of Dec. 4th, says:

The government townsite agent, Thos. R. Lyons is exceedingly busy collecting assessments on city lots, so that deeds given by the government can be delivered. He has placed the number of lots at 450 and the assessment at 12 per cent, or \$48, \$30 and \$6, respectively, on the three grades of lots. The total amount subscribed for the securing of these titles was \$11,000, of which amount \$10,771 was used, as follows:

These deeds are the first ever given by the government to American citizens in Alaska, other than for mineral lands.
