A NEEDED REBUKE.

The Douglas county grand jury just adjourned, had the following in its report to Judge Fullerton:

"From the numerous complaints brought before us we believe that a great many taxpayers made a false statement of their property to the assessor, and have, in other words, perjured themselves. We take this method of letting such persons know that when proven the law will be enforced."

This is rather a shoulder blow but one which is of practical effect. A few grand jury investigations on this subject would very materially equalize the burden of taxation which the honest poor men now bear too unjustly. Such perjury as this should be promptly punished.—Review.

A handsome reward is in store for the teacher, says the Milton Eagle, who can invent a means by which to install into the minds of the average youth such a desire for learning as to overcome the influences of the "baby courtship" which is so plainly discernible in every public school. No combination of circumstances has caused so many boys and girls to lose interest in their school as this one evil alone, and yet there seems to be no remedy. From this one cause thousands of boys and girls—yes, young men and young women, are going out from the schools of this land each year without sufficient knowledge to draft a common sense business letter, and yet they can't bring their face to face with a cold business world. This question is a serious one for the teachers of America, but who will suggest a remedy.

Hugh Medlock, the notorious horse thief, was discharged from the state penitentiary Saturday morning, after serving a term for larceny committed in Umatilla county. He was received at the penitentiary on June 16, 1895, for 3 1/2 years, but gained some time through being made a trusty. When he was released Saturday by the penitentiary officials he was confronted by a deputy sheriff from La Grande, Union county, who had a warrant for his arrest on the charge of stealing a horse and buggy. Medlock is said to be a very tough character and has caused different Eastern Oregon sheriffs many lively chases in the past. The deputy left at once for La Grande, having Medlock in handcuffs.—Salem Statesman.

Judge A. S. Bennett of The Dalles, has been put down as an aspirant for the democratic nomination in the second district. The judge was the democratic candidate in the last congressional race, and was defeated by Mr. Ellis, the republican, who now adorns a seat in the lower house. An effort was made at that time to have Martin Quinn, the populist candidate, withdraw in Judge Bennett's favor, but it was not successful. Had he withdrawn, The Dalles man would doubtless have been elected.—E. O.
