Mail Contracts Let.

All of the mail contracts in Oregon were let last week by the postoffice department in Washington for the ensuing four years. The various Gilliam county routes were let as follows:

The Arlington-Fossil mail contract was awarded to M. L. Gardner, of Warren, Arkansas, for \$717 a year. All of the other Gilliam county routes were awarded to P. F. Stillings, of London Kentucky, as follows:

Condon-Lone Rock route, \$717 a year. Fossil-Lone Rock route, \$345 a year. Fossil-Antelope route, \$264 a year. Fossil-Mitchell route, \$624 a year. Fossil-Wagner route, \$616 a year. Lone Rock-Heppner route, \$534.20 a year.

The longest and most expensive route in the state is that from Ager, Cal., to Lake View, Klamath county, awarded to V. H. Peace of Salt Lake, for \$8217 a year. The next longest is the route from Ontario to Burns, Harney county, awarded to C. M. Kellogg of Baker City, for \$7065 a year. The 3d longest is that from Roseburg to Empire, Coos county, for \$6437 a year. The route from The Dalles to Prineville was let to Robt. Lee for \$5800 a year.

All of these and the hundreds of other routes in the state will be sub-let by the successful bidders.
