GLOBOSITIES.

Geo. Gray, the Heppner sheep buyer, was in this section again last week.

Rev. John Fossil preached two interesting sermons here last Sunday.

Born, on Jan. 30th, at Poplar Farm, eight miles east of Condon, to Mr. and Mrs. Alonzo C. Stevens, a fine little 8½-lb daughter.

W. A. Darling Saturday purchased, from Herbert Halstead, the dwelling house, barn and two lots just west of Maddock's hotel, where he and his family now reside.

Preparations are all complete for the grand ball at Condon next Monday night, 14th, and an immense crowd is expected out. If you enjoy such pleasure you can't afford to miss it.

The Heppner papers say that Thos. W. Morgan of Eightmile, formerly of Mayville, is a candidate for clerk of Morrow county on the republican ticket. Tom is well qualified for the position.

The names of Alex Berry, formerly of Condon, and Frank Abalt, formerly of Trailfork, are in the list of names of passengers, published in the Tribune, who sailed from Portland for Alaska this week.

Prineville has waited a long time for telephone service and now proposes to have it via Long Creek. The day is not far distant when Condon, Fossil, Mayville and Olex will also have telephone connection.

Fremont Wade and Alvin S. Thomas of Clem were up to the county seat Saturday, the former to make arrangements for proving up on his 14d., and the latter to buy 80 acres of lien land, adjoining his place just below Clem.

We see by exchanges that Attorney Austin Mires, of Ellensburg, uncle of ye editor, contemplates going to Alaska in the early spring. Mr. Mires delivered a political address here about five years ago.—Goldendale Sentinel.

Supt. Daggett, assisted by Mrs. Lillian Stevens and Miss Grace Fitzwater, is conducting teachers' examination here this week. Only two applicants are in attendance—Misses Lulu Keizer of this place and Florence Davidson of Matney.

H. B. Hendricks informs us that he believes his brother John left Portland last week to try his luck in Alaska. John taught a term of school near Mayville about ten years ago, after which he embarked in the cattle business in Harney county, and just recently sold out.

Our new minister, Rev. W. H. Barr of Missouri, and his wife are expected here tomorrow or next day. They stopped over and visited Mr. Burr's sister at Huntington a couple of days. The small dwelling house owned by J. H. Downing has been fitted up as a parsonage for them. We presume he will preach here next Sunday.

Branton and D. M. Rinehart. The following will be initiated at the next meeting: Al Collins, Wm. Musgrave, Dave Spaulding, August Anderson, Tim Connolly, Geo. Brassfield and Wm E. Foster.

The republican state league convention at Portland last week elected the following four delegates to the national league convention at Omaha from the 2d district: J. H. Putnam of Fossil, C. A. Johns of Baker City, J. J. Donegan of Harney and J. M. Ferguson of Pendleton. Mr. Putnam no doubt feels proud of the honor thus bestowed upon him, as several prominent politicians were candidates for the position.

Rather than pay \$50 a year rent for the use of a hall in which to meet once a month, the Woodmen lodge at Condon has concluded to buy a ½ interest in the Armory hall, for \$500, the other ½ being owned by the K. of P. and I. O. O. F. lodges. Accordingly, Frank Springston, from whom the money was borrowed, last week bought Pat Skelly's seven shares, at \$50 a share, and it is the intention to buy three more shares owned by J. H. Downing. In order to pay this, we understand it is the intention to ask all of the 50 or 60 members here to pay one year's camp dues in advance, to which we believe there is little or no objection. We think this is a good investment, as the rent from balls, circuit court, etc., will be more than sufficient to pay the camp dues.

Mr. Clarence Butt, a prominent attorney of Newberg, Yamhill county, arrived here yesterday, with the expectation of locating at Condon in the practice of law. His wife and two children will remain at Newberg until spring. Mr. Butt was thoroughly educated in Eastern Pennsylvania and four years ago graduated in the Northern Indiana Law School and was admitted to the circuit and supreme courts of Indiana, then came to Newberg, this state, where he has enjoyed a good practice, but prefers a higher and dryer and more healthful climate for himself and family. He was prominently identified with the republican party of Yamhill county, and certainly merited their confidence, as we notice by the Yamhill papers that his party was desirous of making him the next nominee for representative of that county. But he prefers to practice his profession in a live, progressive town, and believing there is business enough at Condon for another attorney, he has selected this field. He was a delegate to the republican convention at Portland last week and met all of the Gilliam county delegation in that city.

W. F. West on Thursday evening of last week sold his ½ interest in the butcher shop here to his partner, John Maddock. Mr. West was owing nearly everybody in town a few dollars each, but in his rush to get things ready to start with his family early next morning to Arlington, on their way to his former home at Sacramento, he forgot all about his little debts. In fact, scarcely any one here knew of his intention to sell out and leave until he had gone. In order to jog his memory, three of his creditors—S. B. Barker, P. H. Stephenson and Chas. Fix, had a warrant sworn out for him, as an absconding debtor, and sent Constable John Knox after him. He caught up with him at Olex and, rather than return and face the music, he gladly paid the amount he owed them, something like \$20, besides the constable's fees, and went his way rejoicing. His other creditors are also "rejoicing," but in an entirely different strain.

We are sorry to chronicle the perhaps fatal tragedy which happened on Willow creek last week, in which W. B. Ewing shot a sheepherder, Jim Fitz. We have good and sufficient laws to protect property, and it seems to us that this shooting was entirely uncalled for. A good way to discourage such craving for "bad man" notoriety is to hang somebody for such cowardly work. Ewing is the man who had a gun, knife and lasso fight last summer with Ott Summers, which is yet fresh in the memory of the people of Gilliam county.

Rev. G. W. White has been conducting revival meetings here the past week and will continue for another week. Quite a number of Olex people have made a decided start towards the side of christianity, who ought to be encouraged to keep faithful the vows they have made. How much better it is to raise children up under christian lines than to allow them to follow the degraded and immoral ways of the world. Try it, people of Olex, while you have a good opportunity; and you will find that religion is one article that cannot be purchased cheaper in Arlington than at Olex, for all the freight we have to pay, together with first cost, is love.

There was a good deal of enthusiasm displayed at the public school meeting at Olex last Saturday, showing that the people are getting educated to the fact that our children should be educated. It was decided that Dist. No. 6 build its school house, and then other districts would unite; so a subscription paper was started, and in about ten minutes \$362 was subscribed. We think from the balance of the residents of this district that several hundred dollars more can be easily raised; then we will start in free of debt, no bonds and no interest to pay. The subscription books are now open at Olex store, and all are invited to call and put down their names for a liberal contribution. Let's have a school house that our children can complete their education in and all of Gilliam county people will feel proud of both the building and the children after they are educated.

Last Monday James Hager of Heppner sold 3100 head of yearling ewes and wethers to Ed Marshall of Pendleton for \$3 a head, to be delivered in March with the wool on. Mr. Marshall considers that after shearing, these sheep will have cost him \$2 a head.

ARLINGTON GEMS.

F. C. Hindle, our popular O. R. & N. agent, and his wife visited Portland several days this week.

Rev. Barnhart is still in a critical condition. Another minister will be here soon to take his place, and a revival will be in progress here before long.

Mr. Clarence Shurtle has had a magnificent monument erected at the grave of his family, who met such a horrible death here last August by burning in their residence.

Our new city council met last week for the first time, and, along with other business, appointed Joel Pound city marshal, Mr. Carlisle having sent in his resignation, as he has other business to attend to this summer.

Att'y Gurley gets almost as many calls to neighboring states and towns, on important law and criminal cases, as does Judge Bennett, who is kept on the go nearly all the time. Gurley & Dobyns are building up an immense practice.

The weather for the last month has been spring-like, but the last two weeks has been regular May weather. The first of the week we had several warm rain showers, giving the grain and grass a nice start. Gilliam against the world for fine climate and big fat babies.

Two fire alarms were sounded last Wednesday. One was the burning out of a flue in Snythe's residence, causing no damage; the other was caused by a defective brick flue in Ross Boardley's barber shop, burning a small hole in the roof. It was put out with a few buckets of water. The only damage done, of any consequence, was stopping the play at the bowling alley for about 30 minutes.

The shooting of James Fitz by W. B. Ewing of Willow creek last Wednesday created a great sensation here. We hear that the bullet passed through the lungs and liver and lodged against the backbone, and that the wound will prove fatal. After Fitz was shot he started for a ranch, a mile distant, but soon fell, and as no one saw him fall he laid on the cold ground several hours before assistance came. Just why the Leyde boys, who witnessed the shooting, did not see him fall and aid him, is not explained. Ewing started soon after for Heppner to give himself up and was met by the officers, who had been telephoned to, and is now in the Heppner jail awaiting the result of his desperate deed.

M. J. Chambers, who lived on Rock creek in this county at one time, but now owner of the Elkhorn Hotel at Canyon City, passed through town the first of the week. He is surely the happiest, also luckiest man in Grant county just now. He has been prospecting on a quartz ledge for the last year but never got enough out of it to give him hopes of finding something further down. About two weeks ago he struck the main ledge about twelve feet below the surface where it is about one foot wide and composed of decayed quartz that is fabulously rich. Klondike isn't it in it as to richness. The decayed quartz is nothing but a mass of wire gold and runs about \$300,000 to the ton. He had a gripful of the quartz with him that was worth \$35 a pound. Two men washed out \$700 in one day recently and melted snow to get that water to work with. The mine is 2½ miles from Canyon and just above where the mines were first found on the opposite side of the creek. Oregon has just as good mines as there is in the world and all they need is developing—and Klondike weather, 75 deg. below zero, to attract attention.

LONE ROCK RUMBLINGS.

Every one is anxiously looking for the time to arrive when work will commence on the new road up the Boone hill. Election is not very far off, but road-making time comes first, and we predict that the condition of this new road, which the county court has promised us, will have much to do with the state of the minds of the voters of this locality next June.

Amos Slack informs us that he intends to start for San Francisco about the middle of March to join his brother, who was here on a visit a few weeks ago, and from there they will go down on the coast of Mexico and hunt egret birds for their plumes, which is worth about \$30 an ounce. Amos says his brother and 3 others made \$6000 in 6 weeks at this business last year.

Walt Goodwin moved his family to our city last week and are now reckoned as Lonerochers. Our burg has now three resident preachers, besides Rev. Barnhart, who is over from Heppner holding revival services here. Seems to us that this ought to be a mighty good, quiet place; but from the amount of scandal that has been hatched and circulated of late, surely the devil must have also concentrated his forces here.

Today, Thursday, is the day that the two committees, three from this county—T. G. Johnson of Condon, E. P. Weir of Mayville and W. S. Thompson of Fossil; and three from Sherman county—Sheriff Holder, County Com. Orr and Frank Sayre, were recently appointed by the two county courts to meet at the mouth of Thirtymile on the John Day river to determine upon the location and probable cost of a bridge over the river at that place. If this county assists in the building of a bridge over the John Day river, a strong effort will be made to have it built opposite Ajax, as it is claimed at that point it would accommodate the largest number of people from both counties.

Mrs. J. M. Curl and her daughter, Mrs. Wm Ramsay, and her husband expect to leave next Sunday for a couple of months' visit with relatives in Linn county. Mrs. Curl's health has not been good for some time and it is thought the change will benefit her.

Samuel W. Ramsey closed a very successful term of school at Badger last Friday. Sam is a tip-top teacher and is very popular with the pupils, parents, and particularly the young ladies of the neighborhood, judging from the large number of the fair damsels that were present the last day of his school.

Last week as James Elliott was riding after cattle in a canyon east of E. P. Weir's ranch on Badger, his horse slipped on the hillside and slid over a bluff, breaking its back. Jim was dragged within a few feet of the bluff before he got loose from the saddle. Had he been pulled over with the horse he would have been instantly killed. The horse was one of Mr. Weir's fine buggy horses, and he regrets the loss very much.
