At a populists' convention held in Polk county last Wednesday we notice that Ed Bell, a life-long reader of the GLOBE, was elected a delegate to the state convention at Portland.

Mrs. Ed Portwood and little girl returned home Monday from Arlington, where they had been visiting her parents several weeks. Her brother-in-law, John Stephens, accompanied them to Condon.

Will Meek received a letter this week from his brother John Meek, who has been wintering sheep at South St. Paul, stating that he will return to Eastern Oregon sometime the latter part of this month.—Heppner Times.

It was reported here this week that Bill Stephens, formerly of Condon, but who has been residing in Umatilla county since leaving here, was drowned several days ago. Whether or not the report is true we are unable to say.

Harry Stricklin of Rock creek began teaching at Ajax last week, and has already been engaged to teach in the Sam Thomas district near Olex as soon as his present term expires. Harry gives excellent satisfaction as a teacher and never has occasion to go long without a school.

Mr. C. Butt, the new attorney, left Tuesday for Newberg with the intention of moving his family to Condon within the next two weeks. He is much pleased with our town and people, and believes this county has a great future. He thinks our climate is the finest in the United States.

Miss Florence Davidson secured a 2d grade certificate at the teachers' examination here last week. Miss Lulu Keizer's average standing fell a little short of the requirements, and, although a little discouraging, she can be consoled with the advice given in that old maxim, "If at first you don't succeed, try, try again."

Mrs. Frazer began circulating a subscription paper at Condon Saturday for a parsonage, which will soon be erected near the church. It is being liberally signed, and if all do their duty to themselves and the town, enough will soon be subscribed to insure a comfortable parsonage—something we should have had long ago.

His many friends here will regret to learn that Charles Gross has again been returned to the insane asylum from Umatilla county. When he was discharged last fall from the asylum it was thought that he had fully recovered, but fate appears to be against him. Their friends deeply sympathize with him and his family in their misfortune.

Wm. Rudio, the well-known merchant and cattleman of Long Creek, is preparing to take 500, 4 and 5-year-old steers to Alaska for beef, starting for that region about May 1st. He will take with him 15 men and about 50 pack horses. The outfit landed at Dawson City, will cost him \$25,000, but it is needless to say that Mr. Rudio will return with a fat purse.

The two bridge committees—from Gilliam and Sherman counties, met last Thursday, as per appointment, and will present their report to the respective county courts at next meeting. We understand that they found a fairly good location but, as the hills on both sides are frightfully steep, it will require winding a long way around, in order to get the desired grade.

As per summons, the two defendants in the sheep trespass case, Tom and Lewis Davidson, appeared at Condon Friday. The plaintiffs, John Chance and J. W. Scrivner, were also present, and the defendant, through their attorney, L. W. Darling, proceeded to file answers to the complaints and set the justice mill a-grinding. It had all the appearance of the beginning of a long-fought battle, and court was adjourned until Monday. To the surprise of all, Sunday evening John Scrivner and Tom Davidson came over to town together, apparently the best friends in the world, and reported that they had compromised the matter, and had the case dismissed. The costs were all paid and they returned home together again, as happy as larks. The plaintiffs were represented by H. B. Hendricks, who was to be assisted in the Scrivner case by Mr. Butt, the new lawyer.

ARLINGTON GEMS.

Farmers are beginning to bring wheat in here now, the roads being in very good shape for hauling grain.

A Smythe and H. Clay went East the first of the week to put their mutton sheep on the Chicago market.

We understand that Jim Fitz will be taken to one of the Portland hospitals in a few days. There is some hope of his recovery, and he can get better attention there than out where he is now.

The firm of Sharrard & Tobey has been changed, Mr Sharrard retiring from the firm, and Mr Wm Tobey, who came out from Wisconsin this winter, taking his place. The firm name is now Tobey Bros.

Farmers have begun to poison sandrats in this section. This is the time of year to poison them to good advantage. A few bushels of poisoned wheat put out now will save hundreds of bushels from being cut by rats in the spring.

Last week there was quite a spirited boxing contest between the Arlington players and a crowd of Washington players, the losers to pay for the games and to furnish an oyster supper for all the players. The Arlington boys had a walk-over, with about 250 pins in the lead.

The weather still keeps warm, and grass is growing nicely. There has been no frost for some time and if there is no change soon the fruit trees will begin to bloom, which may work a hardship on the fruit crop this spring, as there is likely to be frost later on that will "nip them in the bud."

A Smythe has bought the three corner lots from Mrs Beardsley, where the Arthur Coffin residence stood before it was burned a few years ago. He has had the property graded, and will soon let the contract for the building of a very fine residence thereon. Since Arlington has become known to have such a fine winter climate, people are beginning to make preparations to build the town up and make this place their permanent home.

The Klondike fever has struck several of our countrymen about here, who are making preparations to leave soon for the frozen North. Bob Walker, the old sheepman, who lives just south of town, will start in a short time, taking some horses along, and expects to pack through to Dawson City this summer. The men who stay at home this summer will more than likely get extra good wages, as hands will be scarce here. But thousands of them who go North will repent before they get back.

The death of Rev. G. W. Barnhart occurred Tuesday evening, after several weeks of painful suffering with hemorrhage of the brain. It is presumed the funeral will be conducted under the auspices of the W. O. W., of which he was an honored member. The deceased was about 34 years of age and leaves a wife and two little children, besides a host of friends, to mourn his untimely death. Since he came out four years ago from his native state, Missouri, he has done much good and noble work in the cause of christianity in this county, and his memory will always be held in the highest esteem by all who knew him.

Populist Primaries.

The populists of Gilliam county are requested to meet at the usual voting places in the different precincts on March 14, 1898, at 2 o'clock P. M. and elect delegates to the populist county convention, which is called to meet at Condon on Saturday, March 12, 1898, at 10 o'clock A. M., to elect delegates to the state convention, which meets at Portland on March 23d; and for any other business that may properly come before the convention. Each precinct is entitled to one delegate at large and one for every 15 votes and one for every fraction of 8 or over; the appointment being made from the vote cast two years ago for W. J. Edwards for representative, as follows:
