

THE GLOBE takes pleasure in reproducing from an exchange, the following brief review of the career of Judge W. L. Bradshaw, who has been renominated by the democrats, and unanimously endorsed by the populists and silver-republicans of this district for circuit judge.

Judge Bradshaw was born in Missouri, September 28, 1858, and came to Oregon with his parents in 1865. He received his early education in the public schools of Yamhill county and later attended the state agricultural college at Corvallis. His legal education was pursued in the St. Louis Law school from which he graduated in 1881, and on his return to Oregon entered the practice in partnership with his father. In 1889 he came to The Dalles, opening an office here, practicing in the district until appointed judge on the resignation of Judge Bird. At the election of 1892 he received the nomination for judge at the hands of the democratic party, and was elected by a handsome majority.

The following from the Prineville Review shows in what esteem Judge Bradshaw is held in that part of his district. The judge evidently has as many friends in Crook county as he has in Gilliam:

"The democratic convention has again nominated Judge W. L. Bradshaw for the office of circuit judge of this judicial district. No better nomination could have been made. For several years he has presided over our circuit court, and the people of this county, regardless of party, want him re-elected, and Crook county will give him a rousing majority next June against any man that can be pitted against him. His decisions have been just and equitable; he dispatches business promptly; he is courteous and obliging to all, and in consequence the voters of this district would like to see him elected. This is not a political office, and when a man has been tried and has met the test it is not the best to make a change."

In our advertising columns, this week, will be found the two tickets, now before the people of the state and county for election. In each of them will be found the names of some mighty good men, and while the GLOBE expects that every man in Gilliam county will vote about as he pleases, it would suggest that a good way to secure first-class public officers either in county or state is to vote for the men whom you believe to be best qualified to discharge the duties of the office to which they may aspire without regard to the party to which they, or you, may belong. We confess that we are not well enough versed in the science of public economy to understand in what way a man's views on the tariff or the money question can affect his ability or lack of ability, as the case may be, to properly discharge the duties of a county office. Look out for your own interests, voters, by electing the very best men to office, without regard to party.

F. A. Falkenburg, Head Consul Woodmen of the World, has issued a letter to camps requesting that all camps of the order having one or more members serving in the army in the present war shall make provision for the payment of such member's dues during the time they are in the service. Also that in case it becomes necessary a voluntary assessment of 25 cents from each member will be asked for to create a fund with which to care for sick or wounded members of the order in the army. This action shows the Woodmen to be true blue so far as patriotism goes.

Gilliam county horsemen should not overlook the fact that the war is likely to create an extensive demand for horses. The war department has already appropriated \$5,000 with which to buy horses for the soldiers, and if a portion this sum could be distributed in Gilliam, it would do no harm. Some one who is interested should look the matter up.

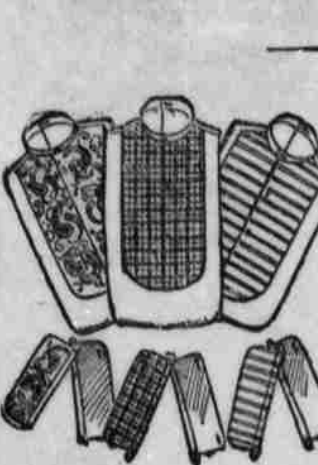
