County court is in session this week. The court house has received a fresh coat of paint.

There was considerable activity noted in local real estate on Saturday.

Dann Bros. expect to begin shearing to day at Duthie's corral 3 1/2 miles south-east of town.

L. O. Ralston, the Olex merchant, was in town yesterday on business before the county court.

Darling & McFarland have finished a neat job of painting and paperhanging at the court house.

Water was struck in the well being sunk on Ed Dann's property on Monday at a depth of 20 feet.

The lively mining town of Sumpter, Baker county, received a full page "write-up" in the Portland Telegram last week.

J. R. Clark is building a new residence on the west side of town, having sold his present residence to Mrs. Balding.

John Madden and Charles Stevens, of Lone Rock, passed through town Tuesday with a drove of cattle for Arlington.

They report crops in their locality in need of rain.

Ed Monroe corralled three big bands of sheep in town Monday night. They were on their way to the shearing pens where they will soon be divested of their winter over coats.

Rye, and Mrs. W. H. Barr left last Saturday for Stillwater, Unatilla county, where they go to attend the annual Congressional Association. They went overland and expect to be away ten days or two weeks.

E. B. Martin, of Chicago, representing Hibbard, Spencer, Bartlett & Co., and E. Jacobson, of the Jacobson Music Co., of The Dalles, stopped in town Saturday and Sunday while on their way to Canyon City and Burns in the interest of their respective firms.

J. M. Paul is in town this week for the purpose of organizing a class in penmanship. Mr. Paul comes well recommended, and it is to be hoped the young people of this community will avail themselves of this opportunity of becoming proficient in the art of chirography.

About 600 head of cattle passed through town Tuesday en route to Arlington for delivery to Mr. Reynolds, of Nebraska. They belonged to E. P. Weir, W. J. Edwards, W. Worley, E. W. Crane and Paul Griner. About 1500 head of cattle will leave Gilliam county in this shipment.

A band of cattle being driven to Arlington for shipment, this week, were turned into a pasture in the neighborhood of Mayville Monday evening which must have contained some poisonous weed, as several steers died the following morning shortly after being started on the road.

Jordan Bros. have rented the meat market next door to the Delmonico restaurant and will keep on hand fresh beef, veal, etc., at such times and in such quantities as the demand justifies. They will sell strictly for cash and will allow no meat to leave the shop until it is paid for.

An item which appeared in our last issue concerning Mrs. Ed McKinney was erroneous. Mrs. McKinney is stopping at the Condon hotel, during Mrs. Maddock's absence in the East, simply as a companion for the young ladies of the household, and not in the capacity of cook as was stated in the item in question.

A dividend of 8 per cent has been declared by the receiver of the defunct First National Bank of Arlington. This is the final dividend making with a former one, of 15 per cent a total of 23 cts. on the dollar received by holders of the bank's paper. It seems to have been a tolerably well busted institution.

L. W. Darling performed a somewhat novel feat on last Friday by walking, blindfolded, from his ranch, seven miles northwest of town, to the court house door, in two hours and ten minutes. The walk was made on a wager of \$10, the time specified being three hours. Mr. Darling was an easy winner, having 50 minutes to spare when he reached here, but he was heard to remark that the job was the hardest day's work he had done in ten years.

A herd of 300 cattle, belonging to W. S. Thompson, Coe D. Barnard, A. C. Zachary and Frank Sankey, were driven through town Sunday evening on their way to Arlington, having been sold to Mr. Reynolds, of Nebraska. They were shipped from Arlington yesterday together with a large number of other cattle bought by the same party in other sections. The herd was corralled at T. G. Johnson's barn Sunday evening and during the night they stampeded and ran through the heavy eight foot fence on the upper side of the corral, demolishing it as easily as though it had been made of paper.

Late War News.

The first actual battle of the war was fought on Sunday, in the harbor of Manila, Philippine Islands, between the Asiatic squadron of the United States, commanded by Commodore Dewey, and the Spanish fleet. The result was a signal victory for our arms. The Spanish fleet was totally demolished, several of their vessels being sunk or burned by American shells, and the remainder being sunk by the Spaniards themselves to avoid capture.

An unconfirmed report, received yesterday, states that Dewey captured Manila, on Monday, and that the stars and stripes are now floating over the island. The government will at once send 5000 Pacific coast volunteers to the Philippines to support Commodore Dewey and to hold the islands as a base of supplies during the war and as collateral to secure the payment of a war indemnity to the United States in the final settlement of the difficulty.

Spain has evidently determined on a supreme effort, with her combined naval strength, to vanquish the American navy in Cuban waters.

It is feared that Atlantic seaports are in danger from Spanish war vessels, now headed this way, and the government is taking steps to protect them.
