

If there is any advantage, to the candidate in having his name appear on the ticket ahead of that of his opponent the republicans will have somewhat the best of it in the coming election in Gilliam county. The law provides that the names of the candidates for each office shall be arranged, under the designation of the office, in alphabetical order, and in looking over the two tickets the curious fact is observed that in all except two instances the republican candidates get the first place. It is hardly likely, however, that either party will either abate or increase the amount or quality of their campaign work because of this prank of the chance that gave them their names.

The most eloquent sermon ever preached against the pernicious habit of cigarette smoking comes from the different recruiting stations of the army, since the commencement of the present war. The wholesale rejections of volunteers by the medical examiners has been the cause of much comment, but the report of the examining physicians show that outside the ranks of cigarette smokers there have been even fewer rejections than there was during the civil war, while about 90 per cent of those who were addicted to the habit have been rejected. This fact should be a lesson to the youth of the land, that should never be forgotten. If our young men and boys wish to develop into perfect types of physical manhood and thus keep their nation in the front rank of civilization, in peace or in war, they should shun the cigarette habit as they would a pestilence.

Is Condon to have a Fourth-of-July celebration in this year of grace, 1898, or not? We have heard a little talk on the subject, but as yet the matter has assumed no definite shape. The Globe would suggest that this year, of all years, the natal day of our national life should be celebrated in a fitting manner in every city, town, village and hamlet in the United States. The fact that "old glory" is being carried to foreign lands by our victorious navy and that the strong right arm of the American Union is being used to crush out the last vestige of Spanish misrule and oppression on the western hemisphere should furnish such an inspiration of patriotism in the heart of every American as to make a glorious Fourth-of-July celebration, in every community, a public necessity in order to give the people a chance to give vent to their pent up patriotic impulses. The occasion should also take the form of a general ratification meeting of the entire American people which would be a splendid endorsement of our government, our army and our navy, which all will agree is their due at this time. Let us celebrate! Let us show our neighbors and the entire world, for that matter, that Condon, and Gilliam county are as strictly in it when it comes to patriotism as they are in raising bountiful crops of wheat and sheep and wool and cattle.

A DESERVED TRIBUTE.

A correspondent of The Dalles Times-Mountaineer pays the following glowing and well deserved tribute to Judge W. L. Bradshaw, the present incumbent of the office of circuit judge in this district: "In the coming election, partisan feeling may not become so animated as has been anticipated; nevertheless, an interesting political contest will probably be waged. The relative values of silver and gold will be portrayed, corporations and syndicates will come in for a generous amount of uncountable string; bonds and bondholders may perchance be compelled to run the gauntlet of a vindictive tongue-lashing; ridicule, contumacy and odious attacks may fall with more or less frequency into the camp of the apostles of silver, and personalities of one kind and another may creep in by way of variation. These things, however, are far from constituting all the important considerations entering into the contest before us. And, without indulging in details as to many of them, I will say that a paramount factor in the campaign is of an absolutely non-partisan character. Denunciation, abuse and personal bitterness can have no possible claim thereto. The high office of judge of the circuit court, to which I refer, knows no caste, color, section or clique, and he who dons the unadorned ermine of judicial authority must of necessity be one "whom the spials of office cannot buy." Such we need in our district, such we ought to have, and if the people note with that sense of appreciation of the scholarship, ability, justice and painstaking exertions put forth in their behalf on the part of the present incumbent, such we will have. His record is before us all. He has been tried and found faithful to the great trust imposed upon him. He has dealt out justice fairly and bravely. He has manifested a profound knowledge of the law, even in the most intricate complications. His capability of judging of the merits of complicated legal technicalities is indeed admirable. He has saved to the district a vast amount of money in the way of taxes, etc. He has a character that is unblemished, and a record, as we have seen, that is unchallenged. Such a man, bringing to bear upon the office so many years of wide experience, should be retained, and not let such a man, regardless of the party which he represents, be allowed to depart from the bench he has so bravely occupied. It is a duty which should be recognized by the people of the district, and by the voters of the district, that a man of such caliber should be retained in the office of circuit judge, and that the people should be allowed to elect him to that office for the next term of his office."

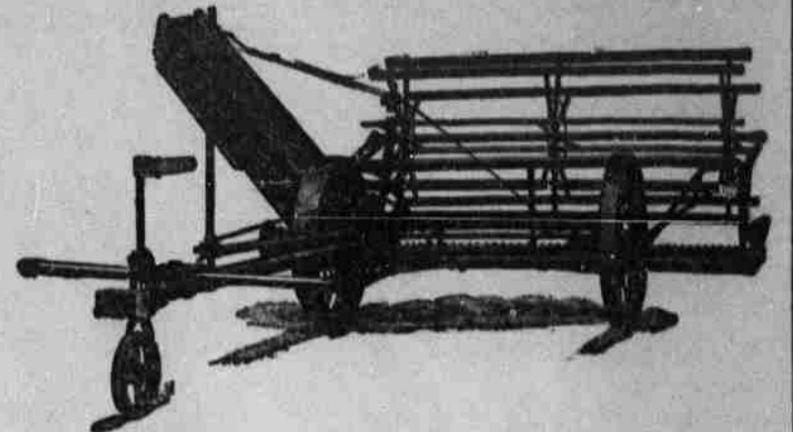
