The Horse Sale.

On Saturday Frank Palmer, administrator of the estate of Irvan F. Nelson, deceased, sold 62 head of horses at public auction, at Johnson's corral, Condon. And at the same time and place J. W. Clark sold 23 head. Most of the horses were unbroken, range animals, and the prices ranged from \$1 to \$45 per head, the bunch averaging about \$10 per head. A large crowd was in attendance and it was generally considered that the horses sold for all they were worth. W. L. Wilcox was the auctioneer.
