S. B. Howard, of Minnesota, addressed the people of Condon, on the political issue of the day, in behalf of the Union ticket, on Monday evening.

A republican meeting was held in Armory hall on Tuesday evening. Miles S. Johnson, of Portland, the principal speaker of the evening, discussed the political issue of the day from a gold standard standpoint.

H. S. Wilson, of The Dalles, nominee for circuit judge of this district, and S. G. Hawson, of Arlington, candidate for representative, also addressed the meeting. A fair sized crowd was in attendance.

Mr. Gardner, the Arkansas contractor who took the Arlington-Fossil mail route from the government at ruinously low figures, we are pleased to state has not yet found a sucker in these parts to take it off his hands, and it is probable he will forfeit his bonds and let the route go back to the government.

In that event the present contractors, Reed & Ogilvie, who have given splendid satisfaction to the patrons of the route, will probably be employed by the government to continue it.—Fossil Journal.

J. B. Goff, one of Lone Rock's best known citizens, has been awarded the contract of carrying the U. S. mail from Condon to Lone Rock, from Lone Rock to Heppner, and from Lone Rock to Fossil.

On the Condon-Lone Rock route a daily service will be maintained, and on the Lone Rock-Heppner, and Lone Rock-Fossil lines the service will be tri-weekly. New rigs and stock will be put on all of the lines and a strictly first-class service will be maintained. The contract will take effect July 1st.

The Woman's Edition The Dalles Times-Mountaineer has been received. It is an excellent number of 24 pages, exclusive of the cover, gotten up in magazine form, ably edited and presents a neat typographical appearance.

The object the ladies had in view when they undertook the work was a benefit for the public library of the town, and they are certainly entitled to a large share of success as a reward for the excellent character of their work. The publication should be a source of pride to the ladies who undertook the work, to the management of the Times-Mountaineer and to every citizen of the town.

Some weeks ago, D. P. Ketchum, a stock buyer, of The Dalles, contracted with S. B. Barker, of this place, for 6000 head of sheep, consisting of 3000 yearlings and 3000 two-year-old wethers.

The price agreed upon was \$2.50 for yearlings and \$2.00 for two-year-olds, and a payment of \$1500 was made to bind the bargain. Since that time the price of sheep has fallen to such an extent that Mr. Ketchum decided to forfeit the money advanced rather than take the sheep.

The sheep sold were from the bands of S. B. Barker, Lewis Barker and J. M. Cameron, and these gentlemen are now making arrangements to trail the sheep to an eastern market. The sheep will be in charge of Lewis Barker, J. M. Cameron, Elgin Myers and Lewis Couture, and will be started on their long journey in a few days.

LONE ROCK.

Wool hauling has begun in this section, some being hauled to Heppner and some to Arlington.

The republican speech delivered here last week by Hon. C. W. Fulton was highly appreciated by those who heard it.

Charley White took 800 head of fine mutton sheep to Portland last week and also delivered 100 head of cattle at Heppner.

The weather prophets predict a decided change in the weather and a very windy spell about the time the county candidates get around here.

Sheepmen and sheephearers have been roaring and kicking for the past couple of weeks about the cold, windy weather, but the fine warm rain the first of the week seems to have put every one in a better frame of mind, as rain was badly needed.

Gene Gilman passed through town last week with a large band of horses, all his own, which he had gathered over in the Fossil country. He is gathering in to Camas prairie. It will take several weeks to gather his horses, as there is 200 or 300 head of them, and they are pretty well scattered over the range.

We are informed, that about the 25th inst., the road workers were to quit the Lone Rock grade and commence work farther on, making a cut off by Joseph Whyte's place. This will shorten the road considerably from Lone Rock to Condon, and the road will also be on better ground and where there is plenty of water.

OLEX.

The Nott school house has been moved one mile east of its former location.

Frank Baker, of Blalock, accompanied Miss Edith McKinney to her home in Olex last week.

Hon. S. B. Howard spoke at Olex Monday to a large audience, in behalf of the Union ticket.

There will be preaching at Olex next Sunday, and after service public baptismal rites will be held at the creek, below the bridge. Several are to be baptised.

There is quite an epidemic of pinkeye among the Olex children, and some adults are suffering with the same disease. Last year the chickens had it. What next?
