LOCAL NEWS.

G. W. Rinsart went to Arlington Tuesday.

Note the change in Harry Halstead's ad this week.

W. W. Kennedy, of Fossil, was in town Tuesday.

Miss Mabel Halstead is at Portland this week on a business trip.

Paul Greiner, one of Mayville's prominent wheat growers, was in town last Sunday.

Jay P. Lucas drove in from Arlington Saturday and was the guest of H. N. Fraser and family. Mrs. Lucas returned with him Sunday.

John Phillips Esq. died this morning at 3 o'clock at the residence of his son-in-law, W. S. Myers. Interment tomorrow (Friday) at 2 p. m. from residence.

R. H. Battison arrived from Marsh, Idaho, on Saturday and will probably remain here for the summer. He is the guest of his brother S. A. Battison.

At McConnell and Charles B. Sears, of Mayville, have been drawn jurors in the United States District court at Portland, to report on June 13th.

John Dymart, of this place, and Andrew Patterson, of Fossil, will spend the next six months visiting relatives and friends at their old home in Perthshire, Scotland.

S. D. Fletcher has commenced an action in Justice Tatum's court, against Thomas Dillon for damages alleged to have been done to his land by Dillon's sheep.

The postage to Manila, under the present international arrangement, is 6 cts. for half an ounce on letter mail, and 1 cent for two ounces on periodicals. No merchandise will be taken.

Prof. Frank Edwards and his brother, sons of W. J. Edwards, of Mayville, both of the Agricultural College at Corvallis, have volunteered their services to the government for the war against Spain.

Harry Halstead, proprietor of the Lost Valley saw mill, was in town for a few days last week. He reports business brisk at the mill now and the mill running steadily. The roads are again in fine condition.

Deputy Sheriff Johnson was over in the Eightmile country last Saturday, selling a quantity of wheat, at sheriff sale, the property of E. T. Persons, a non-resident. The wheat sold at 60 cts. a bushel, being five cents under the price then prevailing at Arlington.

Hon. E. F. Barker, of Indiana, addressed a good sized audience in Armory hall yesterday afternoon on the political issues of the day from a silver standpoint. Mr. Barker is a logical and entertaining speaker and made a good impression on his hearers.

A report was circulated on the streets Monday that Morris Hall, of Heppner, and three other sheepmen had been killed in a fight with settlers in the mountains in Grant county a few days ago. The report lacks confirmation and we give it for what it is worth.

J. A. Kiser, who has charge of the road work in this part of the county, came in from the Lost Valley country, where he has been working for some time, and reports a force of ten men on the road and has about four miles of it completed. About 11 1/2 miles remain to be built.

Prof. McCalla, of Lebanon, this state, has been employed to take charge of the Condon public school next term, school to commence on the first Monday in October. Miss Mabel Halstead will again have charge of the primary department. The primary grade will begin on the last Monday in August.

The following officers were elected at the late meeting of the I. O. O. F. grand lodge at Roseburg: Grand master, T. B. Wells, of Pendleton; deputy grand master, W. H. Wehring, of Hillsboro; grand warden, M. L. Dorrin, Independence; grand secretary, E. E. Shinn, Portland; grand treasurer, T. O. Parker, Salem; grand representative, Claude Gatch, of Salem. The next session will be held at Salem.

The officers of the ship George Stearns, who so brutally treated Amos Stone, a crazy youth who was one of the vessel's crew around the Horn, have been indicted by the federal grand jury at Portland, and it is to be hoped they will receive a punishment commensurate with the cruelty of their offense. Young Stone is an inmate of the insane asylum at Salem as a result of the brutal treatment he received at their hands.

The public are especially requested to meet promptly at 1:00 o'clock p. m. Saturday at Armory hall to hear Hon. Frank Motter discuss the issues of the campaign, as the speaker is billed for an address at Olex in the evening and must make the drive after the meeting here. Hon. B. K. Searcy will address the people immediately after Mr. Motter's address thus giving the voters an opportunity of hearing both sides of the campaign. Make a note of this and meet promptly.

The 25th Annual reunion of the Oregon Pioneer Association will be held in Portland on Wednesday, June 15, 1898. All persons coming to, or born in the territory of Oregon prior to February 14, 1850, are eligible to membership, no matter where they may now reside. All pioneers who can possibly do so should attend this reunion and enjoy another meeting with their old comrades of the days of ox team traveling and Indian fighting.

The report of the death of little Wyatt Putnam, of Fossil, which appeared in the Globe last week has happily proven to be erroneous. The report was given just as it was received here late Wednesday evening, and Thursday morning after the paper had gone to press word was received that he was still living, and since then he has been steadily improving and it is believed that he will ultimately recover. His recovery was the little short of a miracle, however, for a 35-caliber pistol ball passed through his body, entering at a point two inches above the left kidney and coming out at the left nipple. He is six years old. The pistol was in the hands of Verne Cary, aged seven years. The boys were playing soldier when the accident occurred.

EDITOR GLOBE:

An article which appeared in the Fossil Journal of May 20th, urged upon the voters of Gilliam county the importance of voting for the republican nominee for representative of Gilliam county, on the ground that the election of a republican United States senator from Oregon is a matter of first importance in this election. I would like to call the attention of the voters of this county to the fact that, at the present time, there is a majority of 15 in the U. S. senate, in favor of silver, so that, as a matter of fact, the election of the next senator from Oregon cannot possibly make any difference in the action which that body may take in the future on the money question. He knows how every dollar comes that we pay our taxes with, and he will stand by the people of the county first, last and all the time.

CITIZEN.

Drowned in John Day River.

James Phillips, of Lost Valley, was drowned in the John Day river last Sunday afternoon while attempting to ford the stream, with a four-horse team and wagon, at the old bridge crossing. He was riding one of the wheel horses and the animal fell with him and both were drowned. The other three horses made the landing on the opposite side. He leaves a wife and two brothers in Lost Valley. The body has not been recovered.

Gilliam's Wealth.

An interesting pamphlet has been issued from the office of Secretary of State Kincaid showing the assessed valuation of each class of real and personal property in the several counties and the aggregate value as equalized by the state board of equalization. The table credits Gilliam county with \$8,034 acres of tillable land which is valued at \$220,801. Railroad land, 16,051 acres, valued at \$21,133. Non tillable land, 106,724 acres, valued at \$261,023. Some of the items of personal property are given as follows: Horses and mules, 8,031, value \$64,379; sheep and goats, 114,518, value \$14,530; swine, 1,427, value \$2,038; cattle, 8,518, value \$85,075. The summary gives the net taxable property at \$1,222,639. These figures give but a faint idea of the real wealth of Gilliam county, for the reason that Oregon, like most other western states, has adopted a system of making a ridiculously low valuation on property of all kinds which necessitates a high tax levy, thus making a poor showing of the actual wealth of the state, as well as of the actual tax on property, proportionately considered.
