



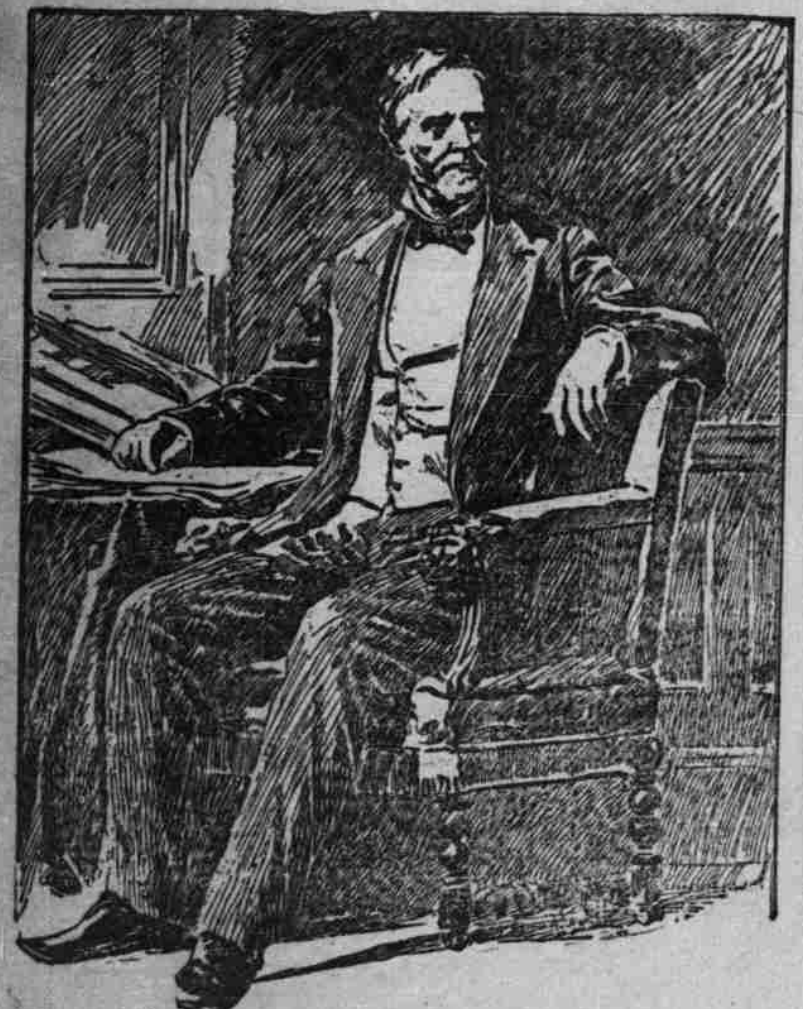

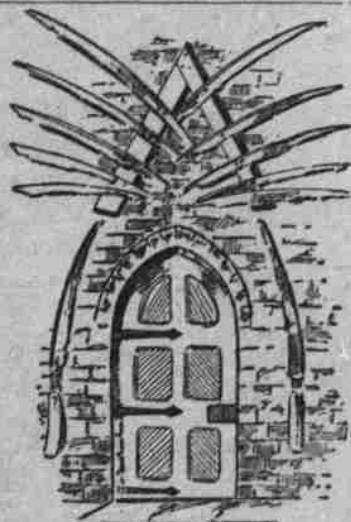
THE MOSQUITO'S SONG.

A Madrigal, Not a War Cry—How to Catch the Flinger.

You can best observe the mosquito in action by letting one settle undisturbed on the back of your hand, and waiting while she fills herself with your blood; you can easily watch her doing so with a pocket lens. Like the old lady in "Pickwick," she is soon "swelling wisely." She gorges herself with blood, indeed, which she straightway digests, assimilates, and converts into 900 eggs. But if, while she is sucking, you gently and unobtrusively tighten the skin of your hand by clenching your fist hard, you will find that she cannot any longer withdraw her mandibles; they are caught fast in your flesh by their own harpoon-like teeth, and there she must stop accordingly till you choose to release her. If you then kill her in the usual manner, by a smart slap of the hand, you will see that she is literally full of blood, having sucked a good drop of it.

The humming sound itself by which the mosquito announces her approach is produced in two distinct manners. The deeper notes which go to make up her droning song are due to the rapid vibration of the female insect's wings as she flies; and these vibrations are found by means of a siren (an instrument which measures the frequency of the waves in notes) to amount to about 3,000 in a minute. The mosquito's wings must therefore move with this extraordinary rapidity, which sufficiently accounts for the difficulty we have in catching one. But the higher and shriller notes of the complex melody are due to special stridulating organs situated like little drums on the openings of the air tubes; for the adult mosquito breathes no longer by one or two air entrances on the tail or back, like the larva, but by a number of spiracles, as they are called, arranged in rows along the sides of the body and communicating with the network of internal air chambers.

The curious mosquito music thus generated by the little drums serves almost beyond a doubt as a means of attracting male mosquitoes, for it is known that the long hairs on the antennae of the males vibrate sympathetically in unison with the notes of a

were attempting to pass. These scythes and hay knives, some of which yet remain in the shafts to which they were affixed in order to render them the more formidable as weapons of defense, are placed against the wall, over the north entrance, inside St. Mary's Church, and are in a fair state of preservation.

WEEKLY MARKET LETTER.

Trade Conditions in the Leading Cities of the World.

[Reported by Downing, Hopkins & Co., Inc., Board of Trade, 711 to 713 Chamber of Commerce Building, Portland, Oregon.]

Professionals are now of the opinion that there are but two considerations in the market, the crop prospects and the stocks. They believe that the price of July will be particularly affected by the conditions likely to make the winter wheat harvest an early or late one. The general sentiment is rather bullish on the price, but it is borne in mind that with less than 1,000,000 bushels contracted at Chicago, conjecture, even without any manipulation, could easily be created. A rainy night might delay the harvest so as to cost a July short seller a good deal of money. The feeling as to September and December is that anything around 80 cents will be a high price unless the crop prospect is disturbed in an important way. With these futures it will make little difference whether the harvest is late or early. If a crop of 700,000,000 bushels, or even 800,000,000 bushels is secured, it is taken for granted a price anywhere around 80 cents is too good to expect. Wheat speculators know very well that crop conditions abroad are as important to the price as the conditions at home; and so when they talk of 80 cents as a high price they presume the continuance of good harvest prospects the world over. That is the outlook now, although there are some complaints of unseasonable weather on the continent, just as there are of "rust and elch bugs in Kansas." There never has been a year without some complaint from some quarter or without some crop mishap. So far, however, the harvest outlook is in a general way a fine one the world over. Each week now finishes a large wheat area, and in three weeks the result of the entire winter wheat crop will be settled.

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Bells in Jerusalem.

Turks and Jews, as well as Christians, according to The Kolossal Volkszeitung, have been much excited by the sound of the three bells of the new Protestant Church in Jerusalem.
