



Matches Without Phosphorus.

The Belgian government has scat-tered broadcast over the world an announcement that a prize of 50,000 f. (\$9,650) would be awarded to the originator of a scheme by which matches may be made without phosphorous. and competitors must furnish a quan-tity of the material as well as 10,000 matches. All communications and packages will be addressed to M. Woests, state minister, president of the committee, department of industry and labor, No. 2 Rue Laterale, Brussels. from now until the first of January, 1899. 


