

A MODERN HERO.

In this age, when the chief aim of existence of a large majority of mankind seems to be a selfish one, the man who will give up everything that men usually hold dear, who, without any compulsion from without and guided only by the promptings of his own heart, and a desire to do good, will voluntarily forsake all the comforts of civilization and bury himself amid the most loathsome surroundings to be found on the globe, there to devote his life to the alleviation of human misery and the salvation of human souls, deserves more than passing notice.

Such a man is Father Conrardy, who was at one time pastor of the Catholic churches of Condon, Fossil and Heppner, and who is well known and highly respected by the people of this section. Father Conrardy is a man of high intellectual attainments, master of a dozen languages, well versed in the sciences, and is now engaged in the study of medicine in order to properly fit himself for the work to which he proposes to devote the remainder of his life. That work he has found in the leper colony of the province of Canton, China, then which there is said to be no more loathsome, horrible, abominable place on the face of the earth. The lepers, 60,000 in number, are of the most degraded type of Chinese, and had never seen a white man until the father visited them two years ago. In order to serve them he gives up everything worth holding in life and takes to himself all that is most to be dreaded and shunned. Behind him he leaves personal comfort, home, friends, the companionship of kindred spirits, the knowledge of current events of the world, and he goes to a living tomb shut off from everything but his duty, with the almost certainty of finally becoming himself infected with the foul disease and suffering the tortures of a thousand deaths before death finally sets him free.

All honor to Father Conrardy! A hero of the noblest type is he.

The action taken by the council at its last meeting in regard to the water works question is in line with the suggestions made by the GLOBE a few weeks ago, and will, we believe, commend itself to the citizens generally as a wise measure. A report made by a practical man on the much-mooted question, at this time, will be of great advantage in the way of giving us our bearings. In the first place, such a report will settle the question as to whether we have, or have not, a sufficient water supply to make water works practicable. In the second place, we can have an estimate as to the cost of a plant, and, in the matter of details, there are dozens of points on which we need light.

Dr. Nelson, state veterinarian of Washington, claims that larkspur is not fatally poisonous to stock as western stockmen have always supposed it to be, and in proof of his claim he has been feeding the plant to sheep, at the Washington experiment station, with no bad results. If the doctor will just dig a hatful of the roots of the plant and feed them to an old cow we have reason to believe that he will change his mind. The poison is in the root of the plant, and many stockmen in the Northwest will bear us out in the assertion that many a bovine has gone to its death because of the larkspur habit.

To be the victim of a bunco sharp in Portland appears to be a greater crime than being a bunco sharp. A few days ago a sailor was beaten out of a sum of money, perhaps all he had, by a quartette of these 'gentry, and he had them arrested. The sharpers waived examination and were released on \$50 bonds. The sailor was held as a witness under \$100 bonds and, being unable to furnish the sum, was sent to jail. Next time that sailor is fleeced he will be apt to "take his medicine" in silence, and preserve his liberty.

"It is to the middle class that we must look for the salvation of the republic," says Justice Brewer of the United States supreme court. "Men who devote their entire at-

tention to the accumulation of wealth are not the best citizens. Those little homes, many of them humble in appearance, are the places to which we must look for the preservation of national patriotism and the spirit of liberty. The pauper is not the man to depend upon in the time of trouble, neither is the individual who inhabits a palace and devotes his days and nights to piling up millions."

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON.

The University of Oregon graduated last June the largest class in its history. The class numbered thirty. The fall term will begin September 19th. Students who have completed the tenth grade branches can enter the sub-freshman class. No examinations are required for graduates of accredited schools. Reasonable equivalents are accepted for most of the required entrance studies. Catalogues will be sent free to all applicants. Persons desiring information may address the president, Secretary J. J. Walton, or Mr. Max A. Plumb all of Eugene, Oregon.

The courses offered are those of a good university. There are departments of modern and ancient languages, chemistry, biology, geology, English, education, advanced engineering, astronomy, logic, philosophy, psychology, mathematics, and physical education. Music and drawing are also taught. The tuition is free. All students pay an incidental fee of ten dollars yearly. Board, lodging, heat and light in the dormitory cost \$2.50 per week.

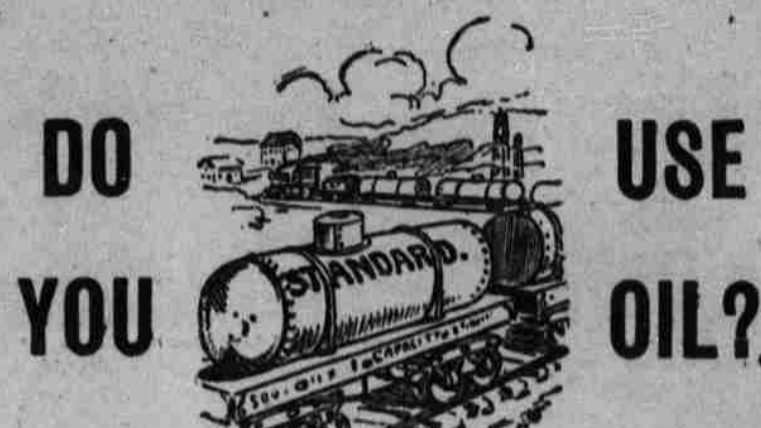
