BRIGHTEN UP THE SCHOOL HOUSE.

Now that school has commenced it would seem a little late to call the attention of the trustees and patrons to the dingy condition of the interior of the school building and to the crying need of a little brightening up of its walls and ceilings. It is never too late to do good, however, and the Globe believes it is doing a public service by calling attention to this matter. It is an injustice to teachers and pupils to require them to spend six hours a day in a room as gloomy and grimy and uninviting as is the Condon public school room, when by the expenditure of but a few dollars the room could be made cheerful and attractive, thereby adding to the health, comfort and advancement of the entire school. Children are more susceptible to the influences of cheerful surroundings than many of us imagine, and, in saying that they will advance more rapidly in their studies, take a livelier interest in school work, and have a better chance of growing into useful citizens, amid comfortable, cleanly and attractive surroundings than otherwise, we believe we are stating a fact that will be substantiated by all persons who have made a study of children and school work.

While it is true that the regular expenses of conducting the school are considerable, and that the district is carrying considerable debt the Globe believes that the expenditure of \$10 or \$15 for such a purpose would be money well expended, but if the trustees of the district believe that the district cannot afford the expense at this time it would be possible to raise a fund for the purpose by private means. The Globe is prepared to state that the total expense of one coat of paint on sides and ceiling of both rooms will not exceed \$1 and may fall below that figure, and it believes that once the attention of our people is called to the matter that some means will be found for accomplishing the work.

We would suggest that the public spirited ladies of Condon take this matter in hand and see what can be done. We have great faith in the ladies being able to carry such a work to a successful issue and should they take hold of the matter the Globe will cheerfully assist them in any way in its power.

President McKinley is a man many-sided. He understands men. He possesses one of the character traits of Lincoln. He can stand criticism and extravagant language at his expense. He appreciates sincerity, no matter if it may carry a sting with it. There is a story going the rounds which sustains this view of the president. Some time before the war began, while Theodore Roosevelt was assistant secretary of the navy, he could hardly restrain his impatience over what he considered too deliberate progress of the administration in bringing on the crisis with Spain. In one of his occasional lectures on the delay he let out such a scolding declaration as this: "The blood of 250,000 murdered Cubans lies at the door of the White House." The statement that Mr. Roosevelt had employed such language about the administration of which he was a part reached the ears of the president, with the suggestion that it called for strong rebuke. But President McKinley met the suggestion with: "I do not think we had better pay any attention to it. We may in a hot young blood later on." And so it turned out. In this little act McKinley showed the strength of his character and a wisdom that stamps him a greater man than ever he has been given the credit of being.—East Oregonian.

While it is true that D. W. Schley have not received the same recognition from the government in the way of promotion that Sampson has, the fact remains that D. W. Schley are loved and honored more in a minute, by their countrymen, than Sampson is in a week. Some men do not need the recommendation of high officials to make them great, others do; it is a difference in men, that's all.

Advisers from Washington are to the effect that a bill will in all probability be introduced and passed at the next session of congress providing for an increase of the regular army to 100,000 men. It is likely the navy will also be strengthened by the construction of a number of vessels, so that it is unlikely that Uncle Sam will ever again be content to occupy a position so near the foot of the class of fighters among the nations as he has done in the past. Uncle Samuel is a young fellow yet, but he is big for his age, and tough and witty as a hickory sapling, and he proposes that from this time on he shall be properly respected, or there will be trouble.

Back From the Mountains.
Barr and Palmer returned Friday from their outing in the mountains of Grant county. Both the gentlemen had gained so much in flesh during their sojourn in the high altitudes that their friends hardly knew them. They report game plentiful, also ice and frost common in the region where they camped. Barr saw his first deer on this trip and killed it with a well aimed shot from his trusty rifle, and Palmer wounded a big grizzly bear so severely that he believes he has since died a lingering death in some thicket. The boys had a good time and only regret having to return so soon. They only stopped in town long enough to get acquainted with their families, and pulled out Saturday morning, Mr. Barr being bound for Arlington on a business trip and Mr. Palmer to Corvallis to visit relatives.
