A family of young pigs on his ranch was almost wiped out of existence by the pesky brutes a few nights ago, and numerous complaints are heard on all sides of their forays on young stock and poultry yards.

The New Well. The new well being sunk by the city is making good progress. The drill has reached a depth of between 30 and 35 feet and some water has already been struck. The rock has been very hard but with the last few feet a softer strata has been found and more rapid progress may be looked for.

Seriously Burned. Mrs. Jas. Cordell, who resides two miles northeast of town, met with a serious accident on an early hour last Friday morning. A lamp had been left burning in the bedroom and Mrs. Cordell awoke at about 2 o'clock a. m. to discover the lamp blazing up in an alarming manner as though about to explode. The lady hastily arose and attempted to carry the lamp to the front door to throw it out, but before she could reach the door the lamp exploded and her clothing was instantly in flames. The fire was quickly extinguished, but not until one of Mrs. Cordell's arms was severely burned, from the hand to the elbow. Medical aid was hastily summoned from Condon and the burns were dressed, and at last accounts the patient was getting along as well as could be expected.

A Big Wheat Crop. E. O. Tobey, of Shuttler Flat, has finished harvesting and threshing his wheat crop of 2200 acres. The crop aggregated 12,983 sacks, of 2½ bushels each, or almost 30,000 bushels, giving an average of a little over 13 bushels per acre. A force of three headers and one big steam thresher was run on the ranch and about 100 acres of grain was cleaned up each day.

Mr. Tobey built a new warehouse on his ranch this season, 48x64 feet, for the purpose of storing his wheat when threshed, but found the building would only hold about one-half his crop.

Mr. Tobey believes the wheat market will improve soon and expects to see the price as high as that of last season within a few months.

S. B. Barker Injured. E. W. Moore received a letter, on Sunday, from Mrs. S. B. Barker, who, with her husband and children, is visiting Mr. Barker's parents at Athens, Maine, which stated that Mr. Barker had met with a serious accident on Aug. 16th, by being struck with a heavy derrick fork, which was being used stacking hay on his father's farm. Something went wrong with the rope or pulleys and the fork fell about 25 feet, striking Mr. Barker and inflicting serious injuries. He was improving and able to walk around when the letter was written, but the accident would delay their start for home a week or two.

The people of Olex have never yet refused to pay any just doctor bills and have to have their people suffer for want of medical aid.

Reasonable equivalents are accepted for most of the required entrance studies. Catalogues will be sent free to all applicants. Persons desiring information may address the president, Secretary J. J. Walton, or Mr. Max A. Flom, all of Eugene, Oregon.

The courses offered are those of a good university. There are departments of modern and ancient languages, chemistry, biology, geology, English, education, advanced engineering, astronomy, logic, philosophy, psychology, mathematics, and physical education. Music and drawing are also taught. The tuition is free. All students pay an incidental fee of ten dollars yearly. Board, lodging, heat and light in the dormitory cost \$2.50 per week.
