The Philippine commissioners should by all means retain one small uninhabited island of that group as a retreat for Secretary Alger. His Nobs could perhaps do less harm in a locality of that description than anywhere else in the known world. If President McKinley could be induced to disengage with his services the balance of the American people would bid him God-speed on his journey thither—if he would first sign an agreement never to return.

President McKinley wants Dewey to go to Paris to advise the peace commission, but Dewey prefers to remain at Manila and be ready for business in case peace should not be finally agreed upon. Dewey does not seem to be much given to making grand stand plays before the public, but if there is any likelihood of "a bit of a fight" anywhere he wants to be right there. The president should let Dewey alone. He will protect our interests in the East even if he has to sink the German squadron in doing so.

If there is any one thing that Idaho populists are good for, more than another, it is to disagree. At the recent state conventions of all the silver parties, held in Boise on the same date for the purpose of fusion, the pops got into a jangle between themselves and organized two conventions. The democrats and silver republicans refused to have anything to do with them unless they could agree in their own camp, and the result is two populist tickets are in the field. Idaho populists should go soak their heads in the placid waters of Snake river.

In just one year Kansas will owe no one a dollar except the State of Kansas. At that time the block of state bonds will be paid and refunded in bonds which will be owned by the state permanent school fund. All of the other bonds are so owned. The payment of interest is simply a matter of book keeping in the State Treasurer's office. Bonds amounting to \$47,000 have just been taken up in a similar way. By this change the State saves in interest charges, as the new bonds bear four per cent, while the old ones draw 7.—Advocate and News, Topeka, Kansas.

In city enterprise, Glasgow, Scotland, is far ahead of all other cities. She has not levied any city tax at all for two years. Profits on business owned and operated by the city pay all expenses. It has owned its gas and water works for many years. In 1894 it bought the street railways and is now about to establish a city bank. The city provides swimming baths at 4 cents a swim, and city wash-houses where housewives can take their week's washing and have hot and cold water, fixed with bath tubs and conveniences that only the wealthy can afford for themselves, for less than fuel alone would cost at home.—Times Mountaineer.
