Otis Helms, who was very seriously injured a few weeks ago by being thrown from a horse, near Fossil, and who was unconscious for days, has regained consciousness and is rapidly recovering.

W. L. Barker's threshing outfit is at Howard Propert's this week. Mr. Barker thinks the grain he has threshed will average about 20 bushels to the acre. His own crop made about 7000 bushels.

C. L. Baker finished heading last week and began threshing Monday. He has about 300 acres of wheat this year and it is all of No. 1 quality. Mr. Baker will run his threshers as long as there is anything to thresh.

On last Saturday P. H. Stephenson, administrator, sold 49 head of horses belonging to the estate of John Lion, deceased. The horses sold low, bringing only a trifle over \$400 per head on an average. G. L. Neal was the auctioneer.

Mr. and Mrs. G. J. Caven, of Pine Creek, visited their daughters, Mesdames Wilcox and Pinkham, last Saturday and Sunday. They brought over a load of the choice fruit, for which their orchard is famous, and found a ready market for it among Condon people.

Died—Sunday morning, September 4, 1898, after an illness of only a few hours, Lawrence, the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Pong, aged about ten months. The funeral occurred at the Condon cemetery on Monday afternoon. This is the twin brother of the child who was so seriously ill here a few months ago.

G. G. Parman finished heading and threshing Tuesday on his farm 3 1/2 miles from Condon. He ran both of his headers and threshing machine full blast and averaged about 800 bushels a day. The grain was very thick and heavy and yielded enormously. Mr. Parman has sold his interest in the machine to Cooke Bros.

D. S. Wright returned Monday from Indiana, where he went several weeks ago with a carload of horses. Mr. Wright says times are fairly good in the Hoosier state. He did not sell many of his horses, preferring to leave them with his brothers, who reside there, until the horses were in better condition for the market.

E. Jacobson, of The Dalles, the well known and highly respected dealer in musical instruments, passed away from Condon on Tuesday, the 6th inst., after a brief illness of but a few hours. He didn't go "up higher," but, instead, breath he assured his friends that, like spring flowers and summer days, he will come again. "Jaakey" is due in Condon again in about a month.

Jim Cameron, Louis Barker, Louis Couture and Edin Myers are now at South Pass City, Wyo., with their sheep. Jim writes to a friend in Condon that they have traded off 2300 head of sheep for a widow lady and her two grown daughters, and that the other three boys have appropriated the new property and left him out. Jim says there are "other pebbles on the beach," though, and some sheep left, and that he is not in despair yet.

Mr. John Hudson, who is engaged in selling fruit trees in this section, shows us a fine specimen of the "Wolf River" apple tree, which was grown on the Lovegren ranch, about 12 miles east of Lone Rock. Mr. Lovegren has 100 fine apple trees just coming into bearing, and his place is on high, dry land. All that is necessary to raise fruit in Gilliam county is to plant the trees and take care of them. Nature will do the rest.

Jack Shelton, of Mayville, is buying a carload of cattle for Mr. Reynolds, of Nebraska.

Governor Lord has called a special session of the state legislature, to meet at Salem on the 20th inst.

The K. Ps will install their officers next Tuesday night. All members are respectfully requested to be present.

An election was held in Arkansas on Monday, and it is feared the population of the state was materially decreased on that day.

Thomas F. Bayard, who represented this government at the Court of St. James, is reported dying at the home of his daughter at Dedham, Massachusetts.

The Bond Election.

Business School for Condon.

We are authorized to announce that Prof. J. A. McMorris will shortly open a business school here, if a suitable room can be secured for the purpose. Mr. McMorris informs that he has already engaged a first-class teacher of shorthand and telegraphic, and that a teacher of music will also be engaged. The City Well.

The drill in the city well has reached a depth of between 60 and 70 feet and the supply of water is increasing rapidly as depth is attained. Water was struck at 27 feet and has raised, in the well, to within 10 feet of the surface. The vein is evidently a strong one as the "sand pump" which is used by the drillers to clear out the hole and which raises almost 10 gallons of water per minute, makes no perceptible difference on the amount of water in the well.

Coroner's Verdict.

The report of the inquest held over the body of John Buchanan, who was found dead in the road near Olex on August 30, has been filed in the clerk's office by H. D. Randall, acting coroner. The verdict was to the effect that the body was found face downward in the road, the wagon wheel resting on the shoulder in such a way that the man could not help himself. Death was evidently caused by suffocation in the deep dust of the road.
