For An Open River.

Representative Hawson offered the following resolution, known as House Joint Resolution No. 6, at the late special session, the same being adopted on the 3rd inst:

"Whereas, Agriculture is the chief industry of the people of the United States, and upon the prosperity of which all other industries are greatly benefited, and whereas the inland Empire has this year raised the most colossal wheat crop in the history of the State, and whereas owing to lack of adequate transportation facilities the people are burdened with excessive tariff rates for the movement of their crops to tide water.

Therefore, Be it resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon: That, we respectfully request our Senators and Representatives in Congress to urge upon the administration and War Department, the imperative necessity for the speedy opening of the Columbia River at The Dalles and Celilo, and inasmuch as preliminary work with this object in view has already been started, that the same be prosecuted to a final completion with the least possible delay.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Secretary of State be, and is hereby instructed to furnish a copy of this resolution to each of our United States Senators and Representatives in Congress."
