The following letter has lately been received by certain gentlemen of this section who have been interesting themselves in securing better transportation facilities for the wheat growers, stockmen, etc., of this section of Gilliam Co: "WACCO, OREGON, Oct. 21, 1898. GENTLEMEN:—

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your valued favor of the 2nd inst., which has just been received by me owing to my absence in the East. Pressure of business has delayed my proposed visit to your country, and until I am able to make the trip I will be unable to say what can be done to relieve the situation in your country.

Our engineers are very busy and cannot be spared for about three weeks, hence I am afraid it will be a month at least before I can make the trip. I have not received the letter from Mr. Myers, referred to in your last letter. Perhaps it was lost. I am certainly interested in your country and it will afford me great pleasure to be of any benefit to you and I will be glad to have you furnish me all the statistics asked for in my first letter if not too much trouble to you. If possible, give me the number of acres under cultivation this year, average yield per acre, number of acres tillable land in your county which would be tributary to proposed line, average rain fall, etc., etc., and greatly oblige.

FOSSIL.

Lee Phares is quite low with typhoid fever.

Chas. Miller sold his mountain ranch last week to C. L. Prindle.

Aubrose Beard, of Pine creek, bought Charles Prindle's cattle last week, paying \$28 for cows and calves.

Miss Wattenburger, eldest daughter of S. P. Wattenburger, is very ill with typhoid fever, with Dr. Mattie B. Shaw in attendance.

George Smith, step son of Sam Grant, arrived home last week, after an absence of four years. He expects to start to school at this place Monday.

Frank Prindle, who has been repairing watches, and dealing in jewelry, in a small way here the last three years, has located at Lebanon, Linn county.

Sam Thompson received a letter last week from Jas. Morrow, who started for the Klondike last spring, stating he and Jas. Litree, of Portland, but formerly of Fossil, had at last arrived at Dawson City.

The White Oxen of Fossil met last Sunday night at 11 p. m., and after three hours of harder work than any of them ever did before—such as building fences across the streets, carrying out-houses across blocks and sitting them up in front of business houses, etc., they adjourned at 2 p. m., to meet a year hence.

Indian War in Grant County.

Eastern Oregon can never submit to being outdone in any way by sister states of the cleft east, and in order to be in line with Minnesota, our neighboring county of Grant has just pulled off a first-class Indian war. The trouble occurred between a band of Columbia river braves and a number of sturdy citizens of Grant county. Report says that the Indians accused a settler of stealing two of their horses, and attempted to make a forcible entry into his barn to look for the stock. The rancher opened fire on the redskins and drove them off. Next day two white men were shot and seriously wounded, from ambush, and a posse was then organized and the would-be murderers were pursued. A fight took place about 55 miles from Canyon City, one white man being shot and killed, and several Indians killed and wounded. The remainder of the Indians escaped to the mountains or it is likely they would all have been transformed into "good citizens" by the well-handled rifles of the settlers.
