The Basket Social.

The basket social held in Armory hall Saturday evening by the Baptist ladies was one of the most successful events of the kind ever given in Condon. Everybody in town turned out to help the cause along, and every lady took a tastefully decorated and sumptuously filled basket, while the men vied with each other in trying to become possessors of a good square meal. The baskets were sold at auction and the bidding was lively, as high as \$2.25 being paid for a half interest in one of them. Sheriff Wilcox acted as master of ceremonies and auctioneer and did himself proud in that capacity. A pleasing program was rendered in the early part of the evening, which was much enjoyed by those present. One of the most pleasing features of the occasion was the fact that members of all the other denominations of the town, as well as the citizens generally, who are outside of all of them, turned out en masse and seemed to manifest a desire to help make the affair a great success. On that occasion, at least, it looked as though the people of Condon were brethren, in the true sense of the word, and that they were about to "dwell together in unity."

Almost A Fire.

Fire was discovered in a room on the second floor of Mrs. S. A. Maddock's hotel, at about 9 o'clock Sunday evening and had the discovery been delayed five minutes longer there is little doubt but the hotel and the entire block would have been destroyed. The fire was caused by a lighted candle being left on a table in the room, over which a coat, or some other article of clothing, was hanging and which became ignited from the flame of the candle. When the alarm was given a half dozen hand fire extinguishers were speedily on the scene and the incipient blaze was soon subdued. The fire had just made its way through the partition into the next room and also through the ceiling, into the attic overhead and in a very few minutes longer would have been beyond control. The damage done was light. Had the fire gotten beyond control the loss would have fallen heavily on Mrs. Maddock, as she had no insurance on the building or the contents therein.

Canyon City Sufferers.

Sixteen families in Canyon City are homeless and in need of aid as a result of the recent fire which destroyed the entire town. Subscriptions have been started in almost all the cities and towns in the state for their relief. There are sick women and little helpless children there suffering from cold and exposure incident to Eastern Oregon winter weather. Such a condition of affairs should appeal to the sympathies of charitably inclined people everywhere, and the Globe believes that the people of Condon will enjoy their Thanksgiving dinner all the more keenly to-day if they first contribute a little from their abundance for the relief of these unfortunate of our neighboring town. Condon had a close call only a few nights ago from a taste of Canyon City's experience, and we know not how soon we may be in the position they are in today. We have ample cause for giving thanks today. Let us help give these unfortunate neighbors some cause for feeling thankful, even after their bitter experience of the past few weeks.

An entertainment will be given in the Marquam Grand Opera House, Portland, on Monday evening, December 5th, by the employees of Wolff & Zwickler's Iron Works, for the benefit of the widows and orphans of the men killed by the recent explosion on the torpedo boat Davis.
