LONE ROCK.

Some of the stock owners have commenced feeding their herds.

George Shields was over from Wagner a couple of weeks ago and informed us that they have been having winter over there for the past month, and that all the stock is being fed, and hay is scarce. The weather is still cold. The thermometer has ranged from four degrees above zero to four degrees below for the past three weeks. The creeks are all frozen over solid enough that teams cross on the ice.

Dr. S. K. Luns returned last week from Portland, where he went a couple of weeks ago for the purpose of attending some lectures on surgery. He was unable to get instructions on special lines, as he desired, and, not wishing to take a general course, decided not to take any.

The constable from Fossil came over here Sunday, and on Monday morning he arrested Frank Ralston and took him before the justice court of Fossil. The crime for which he was arrested was assault and battery on one of J. B. Joff's little boys. Mr. Guff swore out the complaint against Ralston.

A move is on foot to have the town of Lone Rock incorporated. The petitioners want a better system of law and order in the town, while with others it is a genuine whisky and saloon move, and we predict that the latter party will have a rocky time of it before they make the whisky business scour here.

Joe Robinson, of this place, and his son-in-law, of Eightmile, started for the East on a visit the first of the week. They expect to stop off a few days at Pendleton and then go on to Iowa, where most of their relations reside. Everyone here wish them a pleasant trip and a safe return home again.

ARLINGTON.

Several socials are on for the holidays. Everybody seems to be in for a good time.

There is about 1/4 inch of snow here at this writing (Monday), and the weather clear and cold, the coldest being about 10 above zero.

Wheat teams continue to come in, notwithstanding the severe weather. The roads are frozen, and they haul heavy loads without any difficulty.

The post office inspector called on our postmaster the first of the week and after looking over the work of the office pronounced it as well kept as any office in the country.

R. A. W. Barfoot and family started last Saturday to London, Mr. Barfoot's native city. He has been in the sheep business here for several years and made a stake and will now spend it in the old country.

There is so much ice running in the river that the ferry boat cannot cross at present. Last Monday there was a jam in the river a few miles above town, causing the river to be frozen over, in a sense. Had the weather been a little colder the river would have stayed closed.

We are sorry to say that some of the teams that are driven in hitched to heavy loads of wheat are not fit to be put on the road. We see horses driven in here that should not be worked in the condition they are in. The poor animals are whipped and knocked along by their drivers who seem to have no feeling for them, and our opinion is that the poor horses have more of a soul than their drivers have. Only a few days ago a poor horse was unhitched from a team out in the lane on Shuttler Flat and left to die by starvation; he could go no further, so was of no use to the driver, and it is said he had one of his hoofs pulled off. Such should not be the case in a civilized country. We do not write this as news, but in behalf of the poor dumb brutes that are our abused slaves. In some states their owners would be prosecuted for cruelty to animals.
