NOT THE "BEST ON EARTH."

Our neighbor of the Arlington Record seems to be in a bad way. Wonder if he has the grippe? That disease is said to sometimes make its victims peevish and irritable, and when in such a condition a man is quite apt to say things that were better left unsaid, and do things which, in his more rational moments, and after a little calm reflection, he would not have done. We cannot believe that our neighbor would, if in a normal condition of mind and body, either misquote the Globe or exaggerate and distort an opinion expressed by such gentlemen as those who compose the Shurte & Weir Co., yet in the last issue of the Record he does both. Neither the letter we published, two weeks ago, nor our comment on the same contained one word that should lead any intelligent man to believe that we intended to convey the idea that the Globe is "the best advertising medium on earth." Perhaps if followed to its logical conclusion the statement would mean that in the opinion of the above named firm it is the best medium for their business in Gilliam county, but Lord bless you, neighbor, Gilliam county does not embrace near all of the earth, not even if we were to include with it that "large belt of country on the other side of the river," where the Record has such a "thorough circulation." The Globe is glad to know that the Record has a good circulation, and that the business men of its town patronize its advertising columns liberally. We have no desire to injure the business, or reputation, of the Record or any other newspaper in the county, or of their editors, but rather we desire to see their business and influence increase and flourish as our county increases in population and wealth. We wish to say, however, that what little energy and ability nature has endowed us with will be always used in the direction of making the Globe the very best newspaper and advertising medium possible; and we shall reserve the right to use all honorable and fair means to attain that purpose.

We have neither the time, space nor inclination to indulge in petty quarrels or narrow-minded discussions. We have never called in question the circulation of the Record, the mental calibre of its editor nor the "smallness" that may or may not "exist in his anatomy"—whatever that means—and we assure him that it is, and always has been our desire to show him the utmost consideration and courtesy. The public cares nothing for our estimate of each other's paper; Lord bless you, no! It's the news they want. Let's give it to them.

DIVISION QUESTION.

"The question of the formation of Stockman and Wheeler counties is being agitated in the country interested considerably. Stockman county as originally outlined, we understand meets with disfavor and the boundary was changed so as to enclose the portion of Crook that was intended to be included in Wheeler county. To this change, the Mitchell people we understand will object to, for it would throw

the county seat to Antelope which they don't want. Another proposition is to cut off the southern part of Gilliam county and include it in Wheeler county and make Fossil the county seat of Wheeler county. This proposition will not suit the Mitchell people as they will have the John Day between them and their county seat. The people of Mitchell want the county seat located at Mitchell and the question of the location of the county seat may kill all measures looking toward the formation of a new county.

The people of Gilliam county have gotten up a petition against losing a portion of their county and it has been signed by over four-fifths of the legal voters of the number that voted last June. So it is very doubtful whether there will be a new county. Antelope, Fossil and Mitchell, all want the county seat and the same fight is on that was six years ago when nothing came of their effort.

We supposed there would be no objection to the formation of Wheeler county out of Crook and Grant territory and if the managers are not too grasping in their demands may get their desire. Of course with the Fossil people it is now or never with them. We repeatedly have stated in these columns that the people of the Bridge creek country are entitled to a new county and ought to have it.—Primeville Review.

That's just the way the people of Gilliam county feel about it. We also believe that the people in the Bridge creek country need a new county, but we are not quite philanthropic enough to donate our neighbors one-third of our county to help form theirs. The Review shows up the situation we believe from an unbiased standpoint and it is well to notice that these same Bridge creek people do not want any portion of Gilliam county. The petition they circulated and the first map of Wheeler county published in the Oregonian proves this and also proves that this proposition of cutting off one third of Gilliam county is, and has been a Fossil scheme from first to last.

The Fossil people have tried to make it appear that their only concern in this matter is to help their neighbors in Grant and Crook counties, and, while such philanthropy is certainly very killing, we are ready to wager dollars to doughnuts that Fossil will oppose the erection of a new county as outlined in the Grant county petition, which did not propose to give them a county seat, and that they would oppose setting the Wheeler county line six miles farther south, thus leaving Mayville and Lost Valley precincts in Gilliam county for the simple but all sufficient reason that such a change would render it difficult for them to hold the permanent county seat. It is a cold blooded, selfish proposition, on their part from first to last, and all the concern they really feel for the welfare of the people of any section of the proposed new county outside their own town could be put in one corner of a goat's eye.

Governor Geer starts in on his gubernatorial duties as though he knew what he was about. The firm stand he has taken, in the interest of the people, on many questions, is making him friends all over the state and if he continues along the same lines during his term of office he will have fairly earned the confidence and respect of all the people, without regard to party.

There is little likelihood that any of the new counties that are proposed to be carved out of Wasco, Gilliam, Crook and Grant counties will materialize at this session of the legislature. There are too many candidates for county seats, and each will defend the new county scheme rather than see its competitor succeed.—Times-Mountain.
